COURSE INFORMATION

This course meets **Mondays 9:00am-4:00pm** in **PAC 122** (on online by prior arrangement) with a break for lunch at around noon. Large portions of class will include guided independent work, giving the student to opportunity to receive feedback from their peers and instructor while they work.

Architect's Scale Rule (a standard 12" ruler is fine, but if you can get a scale rule, do) Drawing Pencils (4H, 3H, 2H, H, HB, B 2B, 3B, 4B, F.)

Pencil sharpener

Vine charcoal, various widths

Erasers: White and kneaded are great

Colored pencils, if you are feeling adventurous (this is NOT a requirement)

Sketch Pad, 9"x12" 100 sheets. Roughly 50lb paper.

Technology Required and Recommended

Students "Zooming" in will need to utilize a webcam (or similar) to partake in group meetings and check-ins with the Instructor to receive feedback as they progress through the course.

Course Description

Student Learning Outcomes At the completion of this course, students should be able to:

- 1. Use perspective to communicate accuracy in size, scale and location in a drawing.
- 2. Communicate dimensionality and emphasis in a rendering using light and shadow.
- 3. Understand color relationships and effectively apply pigment/color on a rendering
- 4. Show proficiency in preparing a drawing for different media.
- 5. Possess knowledge of different materials and techniques to create desired effects.
- 6. Examine different rendering styles of other artists and develop a personal, artistic aesthetic.

This class introduces basic drawing techniques. It stresses rigorous and repetitive exercises including in-class drawing and take-home work. The course will introduce you to basic perspective drawing as well as line quality, value and, grey scale, positive/negative space, form, contour, scale, volume, and spatial relationships.

All in-class work and homework is designed to lead to redefine what it means to really perceive the world around you and how to communicate that effectively and efficiently. There is no textbook, but I will give you handouts occasionally.

Attendance is not graded, but missing class will be detrimental to your grade as I do not accept late work and there is simply too much content in a class of this scale in this timeframe to make up. There is no way to make up lost studio time with your classmates and instructor.

The coursework will consist of two parts: In-class lecture and demonstration with accompanying assignments (see calendar below) and your weekly sketchbook assignments.

In-class lecture and demonstration will occupy our 9:00am-4:00pm slot. Generally speaking, I will introduce viewing/drawing concepts to you, we will talk about them, work through a couple of examples, and then students will use the rest of the time to work on these concepts and experiment with their peers in instructor nearby. A drawing assignment particular to the skills discussed that day will be issued. In is not inconceivable that students will finish the assignment in-class, but this is not the rule or expectation.

Students are also expected to complete seven (7) drawings a week in their sketchbooks as "homework." Students should plan to complete one (1) sketch a day. Generally speaking, these should be 5-10 minute "quick" sketches to keep the students' drawing functions limber and quick. These are not each meant to be of the same caliber and completeness as submitted in-class assignments.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Skills

Ability to hold and move a pencil while simultaneously keeping paper from shifting about.

Instructional Methods

Students will learn through in-person and/or virtual lectures with "take home" projects between meetings.
