Course Description

This course introduces major concepts, theoretical frameworks and research methods of cultural anthropology. We will examine societies from small-scale foraging bands to complex societies; students will be able to demonstrate knowledge of global dynamics (issues, processes, trends and symptoms). A range of topics will be addressed from a global perspective including, social, economic and political development and underdevelopment; marriage, religion, gender, and language. In addition to examining the diversity of human cultures', students will be able to apply knowledge of the interconnectedness of global dynamics. Through cross-cultural study students will be able to view themselves as engaged citizens within an interconnected and diverse world.

Course Objectives and Student Learning Objectives

1. Students will be able to identify the main theories and methods of Anthropology as a discipline. This learning objective will be assessed in the Exams, Online quizzes, the group ethnography and in class assignments.

- 2. Students will be able to demonstrate knowledge of the interconnectedness of global dynamics. Assessments will test knowledge about concepts like gender, religion, values across various global cultures and historical time frames.
- 3. Apply anthropological concepts to their daily lives and view themselves as engaged citizens within an interconnected and diverse world. This learning objective will be assessed in the Exams, Online quizzes, the mini ethnography and in class assignments.
- 4. Demonstrate intercultural competencies by comparing issues across cultures. This learning objective will be assessed in the Exams, Online quizzes, the mini ethnography and in class assignments.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

To be successful in the course you must be able to use D2L, and using Microsoft Word and PowerPoint.

Instructional Methods

This course will be delivered entirely online. You must have access to D2L in order to complete the requirements for this course.

ASSESSMENTS

Exams: 4 Exams (@200 points each, 800 Total)

The exams will be non-cumulative and only cover reach week's reading materials from the assigned chapters. Exams will be 50 questions long, and you will have a time limit of 60 minutes. Exams will include multiple choice, and fill in the blank. All exams will be taken on D2L

Weekly Discussion Board Postings (5 @ 40 points: 200 points): Each week students will post to a discussion board analyzing two videos that highlight topics from the course in contemporary life examples. Each student will post a 500 word response to the prompt questions that relate to each video. Students will need to post responses to at least two of their classmates' post in order to engage with each other.

Ice Breaker Board Posting (1 @ 10 points): Each student will post an ice breaker post that discusses their major, their year at school, why they are taking the course, etc. This post will be created the first week of the course to foster community between students and the instructor.
