Course Description:

English 1301 Introduces students to writing as an extended, complex, recursive process and prepares students for English 1302, which more rigorously examines the forms and structures of argument and means to approaching multiple audiences. In 1301 students will write weekly, and will work on essay organization and development. The course will emphasize close reading, summarizing, and analysis of expository texts, including student writing.

Student Learning Outcomes:

- 1. Students will be able to analyze, evaluate, or solve problems when given a set of circumstances, data, texts, or art.
- 2. In written, oral, and/or visual communication, A&M-Commerce students will communicate in a manner appropriate to audience and occasion, with an evident message and organizational structure.
- 3. Students will be able to work together toward a shared purpose relevant to the course or discipline with a sense of shared responsibility for meeting that purpose.
- 4. Students will understand and practice academic honesty.

Attendance Policy

Attendance itself will not be a part of your grade. However, please be aware that there are often in-class writing assignments or activities that take place within the first ten-minutes of class. These assignments count towards your participation grade (20% of your grade overall). Being a summer class, *daily attendance is vital*. If you miss too much class, it *will* affect your grade. Extenuating circumstance (emergencies, illness, etc.) will be handled on a case-by-case basis.

Late Work

Discussion Forums or TopHat homework questions are due in their appropriate locations, on time. Papers are accepted via *D2L ONLY* (email or Google doc links will not be accepted) on the day they are listed due on D2L. Late papers are subject to a 12 point per day penalty, unless an extension has been granted. Extensions must be asked for prior to any due dates. Any revisions/rewrites do not recover points lost due to late submissions.

Revisions/Rewrites

The need for revisions/rewrites will be handled on an individual basis.

Academic Honesty/ Plagiarism

The official departmental policy: "Instructors in the Department of Literature and Languages do not tolerate plagiarism and other forms of academic dishonestly. Instructors uphold and support the highest academic standards, and students are expected to do likewise.
