Course Description

A survey of US history from 1865 to the present. This course interrogates US social, political, and economic history while placing particular attention to identity, agency, and power.

Student Learning Outcomes

- 1. Students will be able to form substantive and evidence-driven arguments to propose solutions to problems or explain phenomena.
- 2. Student communication will follow conventions of grammar and syntax appropriate to the audience, purpose, and message.
- 3. Students will demonstrate awareness of the societal and/or civic issues.
- 4. Students will be able to understand their role in their own education.

Course Requirements

Instructional Methods

Course material will be delivered through a variety of modes including lectures, readings, inperson and online group discussions, interpretation of primary and secondary sources, quizzes, and exams. The course will be managed through the university's MyLeo system. The MyLeo page for this course will give students access to relevant information such as primary source documents, discussion boards, and announcements. Students are responsible for checking MyLeo periodically to access course documents and potential changes to the syllabus.

Classroom Expectations

Students are expected to always be respectful and courteous to everyone in the classroom. Students should attend class prepared to answer questions and participate in class discussions. Students are encouraged to take notes during class as it helps engage with the material and prepare for assignments and exams. Ask questions when you have them.

Late Policy

Students may take makeup exams if they miss class for legitimate reasons (such as a universitysponsored program or athletic event, an illness, or a family emergency). Approval for makeup exam must be given by instructor and must be taken within a timely fashion.

Assignments and Exams:

Every effort will be made to have assignments and exams graded within 10 days after the due date, except for the Final Exam. This allows time for careful grading of all assignments.

Primary Source Post/Responses: 30% total

Students are responsible for contributing to SIX discussion board forums. Each initial post must be at least 300 words in length and must directly address the question(s) posed. Each student must respond to TWO posts from peers/classmates for each discussion board. Peer responses must be at least three sentences in length. Begin your peer response by acknowledging by name the person to whom you are responding. For example, "John, I like what you said about...." Your response cannot be vague. Be specific about what resonated with you in your peer's post. Each student will have a total of 18 posts/responses over the course of the semester. You can find the discussion forum on MyLeo.

Analysis Paper 1: 20%

The written assignment will be based on a primary source or scholarly article. It must be 3 pages in length (double-spaced, Times New Roman, one-inch margins). A prompt for this assignment will be provided on MyLeo.

Mid-Term and Final Exams: 25% each

There will be two exams during the semester including the final exam at the end of the semester. The format of the exams will be part multiple-choice and part essay. The essay portion of each exam will be based on one of the selected readings. You will need a Scantron form and #2 pencil for each exam. The final exam will not be comprehensive.

Students are expected to attend every class and sign the attendance sheet or respond when attendance is called. When absent, students should notify the professor. Students will only be allowed to make up an exam when written documentation is provided (occurring because of illness, emergency, or school business) and at the discretion of the professor. Students are expected to participate in class discussions.
