Course Description

A broad interdisciplinary course in the historical development of the United States and North America up to 1877. Assignments will focus on reading, writing, and analysis.

Prerequisites or Corequisites: ENG 1301 or 1302

Purpose of the Course

This course is designed to teach you about significant events, people, and themes in United States HIstory up to the Reconstruction Era. You should complete this course having a base knowledge and understanding of various factors related to social and political cultures of the United States.

Student Learning Outcomes

- 1. Students will be able to form substantive and evidence-driven arguments to propose solutions to problems or explain phenomena.
- 2. Student communication will follow conventions of grammar and syntax appropriate to the audience, purpose and message.
- 3. Students will demonstrate awareness of societal and/or civic issues.
- 4. Students will be able to understand their role in their own education.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Instructional Methods

Reading assignments and class sessions are listed for each week. Readings must be completed before each class session and have an understanding of each reading and bring any questions related to reading assignments to class. There will be a few assignments submitted through D2L/Brightspace so be sure to have an understanding of how to use the application before any assignments are due.

Tips for Success in the Course

Other than completing assigned readings before each class, if you ever have any questions about the class material or assignments, communicate with me about such things. I cannot help you as an instructor if you do not communicate with me over any issues you have related to the class. Also it helps to plug in all due dates for assignments and test days into a planner/calendar to help you keep track of what needs to be done (this helps for any class you're taking and events for other campus activities/organizations you are involved in, as well as taking into account your working schedule(s)).

Academic Honesty Quiz

All students must complete the Academic Honesty Quiz before completing any written assignments. The recommendation is to complete it during the first week of the course. No written assignment grades will be released to the student until submission of the Academic Honesty Quiz is complete.

Exams

There will be three essay exams throughout the semester. The third one will be held during your final exam time. Each exam will have three possible essay questions, and on the day of the exam I will review two questions you will have to answer. All exams will be held in-person on the assigned class day stated in the Course Calendar.

The Federalist Papers Writing Assignment

Students will choose one of seventeen essays from *The Federalist Papers* to read and interpret. There is a discussion post on D2L where you will post your chosen essay to write about. Once I have responded "approved" you may begin writing your summary. After reading their chosen essay, you will write a summary interpreting the essay. The discussion post will close Friday, September 30 at 11:59PM. Think about who wrote the essay, when and where was this essay published, what was their argument and how does it relate to the process of forming a new government after the American Revolution. Does their idea contribute to what our current government structure looks like now? The summary must be 250-500 words (one half to one page), 12pt Times New Roman, double spaced with one inch margins This assignment will be due Sunday, October 9 at 11:59PM via D2L.

Quizzes

There will be seven quizzes on any Primary Source Document that we have reviewed to be held throughout the semester. Refer to the course calendar for due dates. Primary Source Documents to be quizzed will be announced in class. You will need to identify the Author (5 points), Audience (5 points), Context (10 points), and Argument (20 points) over the document, making each quiz worth 40 points. All quizzes will be held during class on the assigned due date located in the Course Calendar.

Writing Assignment

The writing assignment will go as follows: students will have the option to pick one primary source document from Chapters 1-14 of *The American YAWP* to write about. Other than discussing who the author is, the audience, context, and argument, students should seek to interpret the document even further. How does this document relate to other events and historical themes going on at the same time? I expect the paper to be 1-2 pages at most, 12pt Times New Roman font, double spaced with one inch margins. I will have a discussion board set up on D2L where students will post which primary source document they will be writing about for their assignment. Once I have responded "approved" you may begin writing your essay. The discussion post will close Friday, December 2 at 11:59PM I would recommend choosing a document that interests you most and/or something you already

have an understanding about. This assignment will be due Thursday, December 8 at 11:59PM via D2L.
