### **Course Description**

**SOC 316 - Marriage and Family**

Hours: 3

This course is a general introduction to marriage and family relationships in the United States, along with comparative examples of other cultures for critical thinking. Topics covered include an overview of the institution of marriage and family, theoretical perspectives on the institution, research approaches in studying the institution, gendered identities, love and intimacy, human sexuality, dating and courtship, the single life, kinship responsibilities, cohabitation, communication, dual career marriages, conflict and divorce, aging process, and marital adjustment and enrichment.

This course will involve an analysis of the social construction and social experience of marriage and the family as institutions. In this course, we will discuss particular concepts of marriage and the family as important cornerstones of ways to structure social interactions on various levels, and especially relations of power and inequality in society. The objective of this course is to challenge our taken for granted notions about these topics, and ask the sociological questions, "How constructed/natural is the family?" and "What is marriage, and what is it for?" Students should leave the course with an understanding of the general sociological perspective on marriage and family as institutions and everyday practices, as well as be able to discuss and present informed and reasoned opinions upon these subjects. You should also be able to engage in critical thinking. Critical thinkers are able to -understand many sides to an issue, even if they disagree with the arguments presented; -analyze course material actively; and -set aside their personal beliefs and values in order to understand issues from a scientific perspective.

## **Student Learning Outcomes**

**The purpose of the course will be to gain a basic understanding of sociology in a global world. By the end of this course students should be able to demonstrate knowledge in:**

1. Theory and Content: Students will be able to sufficiently synthesize theoretical knowledge in Sociology. Measured by: Exams/Assignments
2. Critical Thinking: Students will be able to think critically about complex major-related concepts/knowledge. Measured by: Assignments/Discussion Board
3. Communication: Students will be able to communicate, express, and discuss complex major-related concepts sufficiently. Measured by: Exams/Assignments/Discussion Board
4. Sociocultural and International Awareness: Students will show sufficient understanding of responsible citizenship, political issues, and gender relations. Measured by: Assignments
