Course Description

A critical discussion of the sociological perspective on studying descriptions, causes, and prevention of social problems such as crime, mental illness, drug abuse, environmental degradation, poverty, terrorism, and declining quality of life in today's world.

Student Learning Outcomes: This course has been selected as a Global Course—tied to the Quality Enhancement Plan (QEP). Texas A&M University-Commerce

QEP seeks to prepare students for an interconnected world. In relation to the QEP, students completing this course will be able to (LO1) demonstrate knowledge of the interconnectedness of global dynamics (issues, trends, processes, and systems), (LO2) apply knowledge of the interconnectedness of global dynamics, and (LO3) view themselves as engaged citizens within an interconnected and diverse world. This course will provide activities, experiences, and opportunities to reach all of the QEP learning outcomes. The term project in this course will be utilized to assess the QEP student learning outcomes for each student. After completing this course:

- 1. Students will demonstrate an understanding of societal and/or civic issues.
- 2. Students will be able to interpret, test and demonstrate principles revealed in empirical data and/or observable facts.
- 3. Students will be familiar with the major theoretical perspectives and/or paradigms within sociology and to compare/contrast them to their approaches to societal problems

Students that do well in this course will be the ones who post on the discussion boards regularly and are involved in the conversations during the week. Just posting once at the beginning of a discussion and the last day the discussion is open will not result in full credit

Attendance and Participation- This is an online class therefore attendance is flexible! You are required to access D2L while you have time to participate various activities. Your regular participation activities, including the time spent online lessons, and virtual discussions will be checked. You are strongly encouraged to log into the course several times a week.
