Course Description

The focus of this online graduate course is to advance students' understanding of key concepts in the field of Hispanic Sociolinguistics and gain a greater comprehension of the interplay of different variables (gender, age, geography, social status, among others) which regulate language variation. Diverse aspects of Spanish regional varieties will be explored while analyzing aspects influencing their development in the Spanish-speaking world. Students will analyze phonological, morphological, grammatical, and lexical features of Spanish dialects in order to implement these main concepts into classroom instruction. In addition, participants will train to conduct sociolinguistic interviews. The course will be conducted in Spanish and will consist mainly of guided readings, discussions, student

presentations, and a final research project based on the interviews. Readings will be in English and Spanish.

Student Learning Outcomes. Students who successfully complete the course will:

- a. Describe and explain Spanish language variation, demonstrating advanced understanding of main variables influencing language diversity across the Spanish-speaking world.
- b. Analyze and compare Spanish discourse production to explore key differences among regional varieties.
- c. Revise and evaluate proposals to integrate Sociolinguistics concepts in the teaching of Spanish.
- d. Complete a bibliographic research project demonstrating advanced understanding of main topics and issues in the field of Hispanic Sociolinguistics.

Collection of Data for Measuring Institutional Effectiveness:

In order to measure the level of compliance with the university's Institutional Effectiveness guidelines, I will collect some of the ungraded materials you will produce for the class. COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Presentation

This online course will be delivered through TAMUC's MyLeoOnline (MSL) platform. You will use your TAMUC MyLeo account to access the platform and be able to use the course content, which includes short video presentations, readings and materials, discussion threads, and chat/email communication.

Student Responsibilities

Students' participation is essential and required to succeed in this course. Students are expected to: 1) actively engage in all classroom activities, 2) read the materials by the assigned date, 3) complete and submit the assignments by the due date, and 4) interact with each other and the instructor on a regular basis.

a. *Course communication.* Good communication in an online setting is a fundamental component of success. assignments modifications, etc. or with information that relate to our content. I will send individual emails as needed. - *General Discussion Board:* Located in the “General Resources” folder, this board is open to all participants; anyone can post a comment, question or suggestion related or unrelated to the course. All students are encouraged to participate and post responses; I will visit this board regularly.

b. Feedback and assessment: You will be received detailed feedback on your HW, discussion posts and other tasks 72 hours after the activity is due (see the ‘Tentative Course Schedule’ for details). Participation in the online meetings and discussion boards will be assessed through a comprehensive rubric (see the “Course Resources” folder for details).

Minimal Technical Skills

Students in this course are expected to:

- a. access, navigate and use the diverse tools included in the course shell (MyLeoOnline -D2L). This includes how to turn-in assignments, how to upload video and audio recordings, how to participate and respond in the discussion boards, and how to access and use the quiz tool. GRADING

Activities & assessments

Online Participation (35 % of final grade).

Interaction and discussion of topics will be conducted by participating in the bi-weekly the by-weekly discussion forums.

The forums will include original examples, cases, or set of questions related to the readings and complementary materials. Students will participate posting their answers to these activities by means of critical interpretation, offering counter-examples or discussion of particular cases. Students are expected to complete a minimum of 3 posting per forum (about 300-350 words each, in academic Spanish). Postings will be evaluated for content understanding, reasoning, interaction with peers, and language conventions usage. See *Online Discussion Rubric* in the ‘Recursos’ folder for details.

Unit activities (30% of final grade)

Participants will prepare different short activities analyzing diverse aspects of Spanish discourse production (interviews, news, advertising, short-films, etc.) in order to integrate and expand conceptual content. Each activity will include a commentary / conclusion regarding ways to integrate that content into teaching Spanish.

Article Presentation (10 % of final grade).

Students will choose one of the assigned articles /chapters (see complete list in the folder “Recursos”) to design and share an online presentation. The presentation should include: 1) main points of the

reading (thesis, research questions, methods, results, and conclusions); 2) analyze weak and strong points; 3) explain how the reading contributes to understand the week topic. The presentation can be either presented in a virtual meeting [Zoom] or as a video. See the 'Recursos' folder for details.

Research paper (25% of final grade)

The final paper is based on bibliographic research about a topic of personal interest, focusing on an area of Hispanic Sociolinguistic research (for instance: a speech community, a particular linguistic variable, an issue of language attitude, features of Spanish in contact situations, language planning, etc.). Students will prepare an initial proposal (about 500 words) introducing the topic, initial questions, and justification of the topic selection. The final version of the paper should include an annotated bibliography of a minimum of twelve academic sources (mandatory readings for the course cannot be included). For each source, you should write a brief paragraph summarizing main concepts and conclusions, and a brief evaluation. The paper will conclude with ideas to integrate the topic into a Spanish language course and recommendations for classroom implementations. The paper should be about 12-14 pages plus references (font 12, double-spaced, APA style). Make sure to discuss with the instructor the topic before and during the development of your work. See the "Recursos" folder for recommended readings and online resources.

1. Coursework
