Course Description

The course is a broadly interdisciplinary look at the United States and North America's historical development from 1877. Assignments will focus on reading, writing, and analysis.

Student Competencies

- 1) Students will be able to identify significant events, actors, and changes in the United States' development since 1877.
- 2) Students will be able to explain the causes and effects of important events and eras of United States History.
- 3) Students will communicate in a manner appropriate to the audience and occasion, with a clear message and organizational structure.
- 4) Students will be able to analyze and evaluate historical situations, events, and developments when given a set of data and/or texts. The syllabus/schedule are subject to change.

Student Learning Outcomes:

1. Critical Thinking - Students will be able to analyze, evaluate, or solve problems when given a set of circumstances, data, texts, or art.
2. Communication - In written, oral, and/or visual communication, A&M-Commerce students will communicate in a manner appropriate to the audience and occasion, with a clear message and organizational structure.
3. Personal Responsibility - Students will understand and practice academic honesty.
4. Social Responsibility - Students will demonstrate an understanding of societal and/or civic issues.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Minimal Technical Skills Needed

Must be able to use Microsoft Word or other word processing software.

Instructional Methods

This course is an online Competency-Based Education (CBE) course. Learning activities include assorted reading and videos, quizzes, essays, and pre and post-tests.

Pre-test

The Pre-test for this course assesses your knowledge of the United States and North America's historical development from 1877. There are 100 points total (30 from multiple-choice, 20 from short identification, and 50 for essays). You will need a score of 80 to be able to move directly to the post-test.

The purpose of the pre-test is to provide a baseline understanding of your knowledge in this competency. The pre-test is a required course requirement and **must be completed** before placement by Professor into a series of Learning Outcomes (LOs) or Posttest.

Module Tests

Each module has the following types of questions to test your knowledge: multiple-choice quiz, short identification questions, and essays.

Quiz

You need to complete a multiple-choice quiz in each module. It is an excellent opportunity to review what you learned in each module.

Short Identification Questions

The short identification questions require a written response using complete sentences and appropriate grammar and punctuation. It should be one to two paragraphs in length. It should include the Who, What, Where, When, How, and Why of the prompt provided and an explanation of its significance. Significance explains why it is worth knowing about and how it enhances our understanding of the past.

Essays

Essays require a long form written response, using complete sentences and appropriate grammar and punctuation. Expect to write 500 to 750 words to answer the prompt fully. You will be expected to cite any sources and quotes you use (see Student Responsibilities and Tips below).

Assessment

Post-test

The post-test for this course assesses your knowledge of the United States and North America's historical development from 1877. There are 100 points total (30 from multiple-choice, 20 from short identification, and 50 for essays).

The post-test is an assessment of your knowledge of the material required for the competency. A score of 80 points or higher is required to demonstrate competency.

If you score less than 80 points, you will have an opportunity to review the material and re-take the competency post-test. You may take the post-test assessment up to three times. If you have not passed the competency in three attempts, you will work with an Academic Coach to determine another method of fulfilling the program requirements in this subject.

Student Responsibilities or Tips for Success in the Course

To be successful in this course, written assessments are critical. If you do not immediately pass the Pre-Test, you will find everything you need to address the written assignments in the readings/videos for this course. Expect to spend 30 or more hours reading/listening (depending on your reading speed). You may use outside source material that you have access to, but be wary; not everything you find may be factual, reliable, and peer-reviewed. If you choose to use a quote, it should be short, no more than two lines. When reviewing your essay for submission, be careful to answer these questions, and avoid the following pitfalls.

- Does my thesis clearly state my argument and its significance?
- Does the main argument in each body paragraph support my thesis?
- Do I have enough evidence within each body paragraph to make my point?
- Have I adequately introduced, analyzed, and cited every quotation I use?
- Do my topic sentences effectively introduce the main point of each paragraph?
- Do I have transitions between paragraphs?
- Is my paper free of grammar and spelling errors?

YOU MUST CITE YOUR SOURCES. You may use any standard citation format you choose: APA, MLA, Chicago, or Turabian. If you are unfamiliar with any of these, please utilize the sources provided by the University's Writing Center (<http://www.tamuc.edu/academics/colleges/humanitiessocialsciencesarts/departments/literatureLanguages/writingCenter/default.aspx>). If you have a particular question about the

correct way to cite, you may find the answer at <https://libraries.indiana.edu/help-citing-sources>. Please feel free also to ask me for clarity.

GRADING

Final grades in this course will be based on the following scale:
