Course Description:

The purpose of this course is to provide you with an intensive study of Poland, including what is certain to be an unforgettable visit to the country, including Warsaw, Krakow, and Oswiecim. You will have the unique opportunity to learn the politics, history, economics, and culture of this Central European country in a two-step process. For the first week of this course, you will learn about Poland utilizing a historical text in a classroom setting. Then, you will embark on a one week visit to Poland. The emphasis of the classroom portion of the course will be on learning the political history of the country in order to be properly prepared for our travels, while the study abroad portion of the course will complement the classroom instruction by being able to gain a first-hand look at many of the historically significant landmarks that you will have read about.

Please note the following important items:

- This course involves extensive reading ON A DAILY BASIS. It will be impossible to have productive discussions about the course material unless students have carefully read the assigned material before class. We will average 89 pages of readings per day.
- The nature of the material we will read, and some of the places we will visit are of a highly sensitive nature. Students ARE REQUIRED to display maturity and respect for the themes that we will digest throughout the summer in an effort to better understand the political history of Poland.

Format:

Each class session will involve lectures and robust discussions about the assigned readings. You will regularly be asked to contribute your opinions about the assigned readings and answer questions about the readings. In addition to the assigned readings listed in the syllabus, we will regularly discuss current topics that relate to Polish politics and culture.

Learning Outcomes:

All Students will develop an understanding of the politics and culture of Poland. In addition.

Graduate Students will

- 1. demonstrate their knowledge of Polish politics and culture through a research paper that analyzes and interprets the intersections between the politics, history, economics and culture of Poland.
- 2. apply their knowledge of Polish politics and culture by assisting in leading classroom discussions on the course material.

Learning Outcome 1: Students will be able to demonstrate **knowledge** of the interconnectedness of global dynamics (issues, processes, trends, and systems).

Learning Outcome 2: Students will be able to *apply* knowledge of the interconnectedness of global dynamics.

Requirements/Assignments

UNDERGRADUATES AND GRADUATE STUDENTS

Readings Presentations and Worksheets: Each undergraduate student will be assigned to present readings with a partner and help lead the discussions throughout the classroom portion of the course on an equitable and rotating basis. These presentations must be accompanied by a READINGS SUMMARY WORKSHEET to be distributed to all of the students in the class. Each presentation will be strictly limited to 20 minutes each. Your presentations and worksheets are collectively worth 25% of your grade. The same grade will be assigned to both partners who produce presentations and worksheets.

Note: Graduate Students will produce presentations and worksheets individually (without partners).

Attendance: 10% of your grade is based on your class attendance during the classroom portion of the course. Students are required to attend ALL classes and attendance will be taken at each class session using a sign-in sheet. It is the student's responsibility to ensure that they have signed in. Arriving late and/or leaving early will negatively impact your attendance grade. Attendance is critical, discussions are irreplaceable, and course sessions cannot be "made up." I will not be managing any excuses for absences. You can miss up to ONE class session without penalty for any reason. More than one absence will result in a SIGNIFICANT reduction in your grade, REGARDLESS of the reason (excused OR unexcused).

- Attendance Note 1: If a pop quiz or any other assignment is given when you are absent, you CANNOT make it up, regardless of the reason for your absence (excused or unexcused).
- Attendance Note 2: I will NOT reply to any <u>emails</u> asking what we did in class during your absence- We will follow the syllabus. If you miss class, get notes from a classmate and ask him/her if there were any announcements.
- Attendance Note 3: Students who attend <u>ALL class sessions</u> and do not have ANY unexcused OR excused absences will receive a <u>bonus of 2%</u> added to their attendance grade.

• Attendance Note 4: ARRIVE ON TIME! The <u>classroom door will not be opened for late arrivals</u> 5 minutes after class starts. Notify the professor in advance if you need to arrive late or leave early.

Your participation in the classroom portion of this course is worth **5%** of your grade. Positive participation in the classroom includes: responding to my questions, asking your own questions, and contributing to class discussions. Your participation grade will be reduced if you use personal electronic devices in class, misbehave in class, or disrupt class in any way.

Journal:

ALL Students will also be required to keep a daily journal of activities from May 23-June 1. This will consist of at least one handwritten page per day in a traditional spiral notebook (wide ruled) or the equivalent. The journal is worth **15%** of your grade.

UNDERGRADUATES ONLY

Examination:

There is one exam in this course, worth **25%** of your grade. The exam will be 30 questions, multiple choice, and given online on Monday, May 22. You will have 30 minutes to complete it. It will cover all of the material presented in this course.

If you miss an exam, you will receive 0% for that exam.

If you have a **legitimate reason** for missing an exam (e.g. severe illness or injury requiring professional medical care, emergencies in your immediate family, participation in official university activities, legal obligations) **AND** you have **supporting documentation** for your absence, then you may request taking the MAKE-UP EXAM, which will take place at a mutually-agreed upon time and date **-ONLY IF APPROVED.** Exam 2 will be held during Finals Week, therefore no make-up exams will be scheduled, except in the most extraordinary, legitimate, and documented circumstances.

Requests for taking the make-up exam must be **submitted in writing within 24 hours** of the scheduled exam **AND include documentation** explaining and substantiating why the absence was legitimate. An approval to take the make-up exam will be based solely upon the professor's evaluation of your request and any supporting documentation.

Readings Presentations and Worksheets:

Graduate Students will produce presentations and worksheets individually (without partners). Your presentations and worksheets are worth **20%** of your grade.

Leading Class Discussions:

Graduate Students will assist the professor in leading class discussions. Your assistance in leading class discussions is worth **5%** of your grade.

Research Paper:

You must produce one paper (10 pages -not more, not less-, typed 12-point font, double spaced, 1inch margins all around). This is worth a total of **25**% of your grade. The research paper must focus on a specific topic approved by the professor that analyzes and interprets the intersections between the politics, history, economics and culture of Poland. Papers must be submitted on D2L Brightspace ONLY on the due date (**Monday, May 22**). You will be provided with specific guidelines to complete the paper.
