## **Course Description**

This course will focus on incorporating multicultural and social justice books at all levels (EC-12th grade classes) within the literacy classroom. This course will also address social justice issues and explain how literature contributes to the knowledge that encourages the fair division of economic, political, and social rights and opportunities. Additionally, in this course, you will learn ways to help students engage in critical literacy conversations.

## **Student Learning Outcomes**

- 1. Students will realize the role of one's own culture and sociocultural ideologies in reading and responding to this literature and that varying perspectives exist for any piece of literature.
- 2. Students will create a knowledge base of multicultural children's and social justice literature and authors.
- 3. Students will explore and analyze current political perspectives and policies that may impact how they select diverse text and plan culturally responsive literacy experiences.
- 4. Students will demonstrate an understanding of the criteria for selecting texts that reflect cultural diversity and that may address various social issues as they plan literacy lessons.
- 5. Students will explore and analyze various literacy-based curricula or programs which center diversity, equity, and inclusion
- 6. Students will investigate the professional literature to determine the research base concerning the impact of social justice issues on children's literature and the effective integration of children's literature into the elementary/middle/high school curriculum.

## **COURSE REQUIREMENTS**

## Minimal Technical Skills Needed

Students will need the following technical skills: use of the learning management system, Microsoft Word and PowerPoint, presentation and graphics programs, and research databases.

## **Instructional Methods**

This Masters level class is online, and all interactions, meetings, assignments will be conducted asychronously. Students will be responsible for engaging in online discussions, review the content, and participate in cooperative partner or group work.

# Student Responsibilities or Tips for Success in the Course

- 1. **REQUIRED READING:** Students are required to read the chapters on the syllabus **before** the class sessions. Students will be more prepared to engage in the content and assignments covered in class.
- **2. EXPECTED HOURS OF OUTSIDE WORK:** For each 3 hour course, expect to spend 3-6 hours per week in reading, assignments, and projects. Students must also complete 15 hours of observation for this class too. Plan accordingly.
- **3. WRITTEN WORK:** All work turned in must be typed, 12 pt. font, double spaced when turned in. All references must be cited in APA 7<sup>th</sup> format must also be used.
