Course Objective

This course addresses diversity and inclusion issues and challenges, primarily from the constructs of race, gender, and social class viewed from a broader sociological context and then focused to the context of higher education. Other constructs will be examined as time permits.

Course Contents

This course has four learning components (with the term paper as its fifth unit), each with its now discussion forum and writing assignment.

- Unit 1: Race, Part 1, Runs from June 5-11, 2023.
- Unit 2: Race, Part 2, Runs from June 12-June 18, 2023.
- Unit 3: Race, Part 3, Runs from June 19 June 25, 2023.
- Unit 4: Gender, Social Class, Other "isms," Runs from June 26 July 2, 2023.
- Unit 5: Epilogue, Due Date for Term Paper is July 6, 2023.

Your performances in Units 1 to 4 will constitute 80% of your grade. Your final term paper will constitute the remaining 20% of your final grade.

If you received an average weighted score of 79% or less, you will get a grade of "C." A score between 80% to 89% will earn you a grade of "B," and any score 90% or higher will earn you the highest grade of "A."
