UNITED STATES GOVERNMENT PSCI 2305-01W Summer I 2023

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COURSE DESCRIPTION

The purpose of this course is to study the underlying ideas, principles, and participatory practices of constitutional government in the United States. This course will introduce you to the formation of the federal constitution, and the challenges and opportunities granted by federalism and representative government in the United States. We will also analyze civil liberties and civil rights and the roles that public opinion and the media play in U.S. politics.

STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES

- Explain the origin and development of constitutional democracy in the United States.
- Demonstrate knowledge of the federal system.
- Describe separation of powers and checks and balances in both theory and practice.
- Demonstrate knowledge of the legislative, executive, and judicial branches of the federal government.
- Evaluate the role of public opinion, interest groups, and political parties in the political system.
- Analyze the election process.
- Describe the rights and responsibilities of citizens 8. Analyze issues and policies in U.S. politics.

FORMAT OF THE COURSE

This is a fully online class. You're required to follow the course requirements on D2L on a regular and timely basis. Study guides, the grading rubric for your writing assignment, PowerPoints and lecture notes can be found on D2L.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Weekly Discussions: Every week, on Sunday, I will post a discussion question on D2L relevant to that week's material. You are responsible to post an answer until next Sunday, 11.59 pm, every week. Discussion posts must be about 250-300 words, concise, and to the point. You must be making the relevant connections to class material within your post. You won't get full credit if you use fillers (irrelevant words or statements) in your posts just to reach the required word count.

Weekly Quizzes: You will have weekly multiple-choice quizzes (total of 5). Each quiz will be composed of 30 multiple-choice questions. You will be able to take them online through D2L each week. I will set up the quizzes on D2L every Thursday and you will have until Sunday to take it. Quizzes will be timed and must be completed at one sitting. Quizzes won't be cumulative. Study guides will be provided.

Critical Op-ed: The "op-ed", or opinion paper, is a classic form of essay which is meant to express well-informed, well-articulated opinions for publication in the editorial pages of newspapers. Opeds are subjective pieces and reflect the author's personal opinion on a particular topic, but the author is responsible for backing his/her opinions with facts and evidence. A well-written op-ed must be concise while still being comprehensive.

To complete the op-ed assignment, students are required to write a critical opinion piece on a topic of their choice which must be relevant to U.S. Government and Politics. Op-eds are expected to be 500-750 words in length (no less, no more), double-spaced, written with Times New Roman, 12-point font. The deadline for submitting the op-ed is **July 2, 11.59 pm** on D2L. A detailed guideline and grading rubric for the op-ed assignment can be found on D2L.
