Course description:

In this online course you will gain an understanding of the word-formation component of language. We will examine morphology, or word-formation, from both a historical as well as a contemporary perspective: emphasis will be placed on the study of words from both Latin and Greek roots, and how they are used to form some of the most frequently used academic words.

Course Learning Outcomes:

1. You will gain an understanding of some aspects of the English language relating to word formation, in a historical perspective.

2. You will gain an understanding of how these roots will help you to expand your academic vocabulary.

3. You will also become familiar with using online dictionary resources.

4. You will learn the meaning of a number of words that you may have been unfamiliar with or that you may have used mistakenly.

English 317 will require daily work on the part of the student.

You will have four quizzes per week, and the content will require you to utilize the textbook and D2L. There is also an 8-episode documentary for you to watch during the first 4 weeks. After each episode, there will be several questions regarding the episode, which will also be counted for credits. There will be a final examination and a final project to measure the learning outcome in week 4 and week 5.

Please Remember: English 317 is *not* a correspondence course that you can do at your own speed/convenience. It is a skills-based course in which you need to build your knowledge step by step in each day's work. Therefore, you should keep track of your progress in the class in a timely manner.

Quizzes: There will 18 quizzes in total. In each quiz, you will be asked to write five very short essays to analyze five words given by the instructors. It can be found in the quiz section under each class thread. A sample quiz answer will be provided along with those words. You should not copy and paste any external resources without proper citations. You should use the <u>APA style</u> for citations in your quizzes and other assignments.

TAE questions: The TAE questions are designed to check your comprehension on the video. It can be found in the discussion board for classes in which you are assigned to watch the video.

Note: You will need to write down your answers to the TAE questions and submit them along with your answers to the quiz of the day **in one word document (doc. & docx.)**

Final project: In this project, you will utilize the COCA or COHA corpus and conduct a research project on the use of a word of your choice across different genres or throughout English history. You will write a two-page report on your findings. A detailed explanation of this project will be found in the D2L under class thread **Week 4**.

Final exam: The final exam consists of 2 parts. In the first part, there will be 10 very short essay questions, in which you will be asked to define and talk about a family of words. For example: what does "submit" mean? How is the word related to "subordinate" and "subaltern"? In the second part, you will choose to answer two questions regarding the history of English language from a poll of questions. Each question should be answered in around 200 words.

Participation: You are responsible for attending class and keeping a log of your attendance. To participate in this class, you will provide roots/prefix/suffix you think that are interesting or useful, give a short explanation of its meaning and origin. You will also provide at least 3 words that use this root/prefix/suffix. For the first discussion, please

post a short introduction of yourself to the student lounge. <u>All these postings will be</u> <u>counted towards your participation.</u>

* Late work policy: Failure to submit quizzes and the final examination within the given time period will result in a zero (0) on the said quiz or examination unless <u>you have</u> discussed an exception with your instructor at least 12 hours before the due date of the said assignment and received a confirmation from your instructor.

* Format requirements of assignments:

(1) You will post your quizzes in the designated **Submission Folder** before the given deadline at the end of each class instructions. <u>Please do not send work in separate files--put</u> <u>all exercises into ONE Word file with your name at the top of the first page. Papers</u> <u>without names will have two (2) points deducted.</u>

(2) You should use APA style for in-text citations and references. <u>Any inappropriate use of</u> citations will be considered plagiarism and have five (5) points deducted.

Note: Please note that this means that no excuse will be accepted for failure to comply with all the class requirements. Students needing particular attention should notify the instructors during the first week. If you miss a class you are responsible to receive the information you missed.

Course Specific Procedures/Policies

Academic Honesty Policy

Texas A&M University-Commerce does not tolerate **plagiarism** and other forms of **academic dishonesty**. Cheating, including plagiarizing papers in whole or part,

will result in a grade of zero (0) on the assignment for the first offense and failure of the course for any subsequent offenses.

Attendance Policy

Because your active participation in discussions is expected, attendance is vital for success in this course. Attendance is defined here as studying the readings, doing the assignments, and turning in homework. Since this is an online course there are no face-to-face meetings. However, assignments must be completed within a 48 hours window beginning from when the assignment is available. For example, if an assignment is due on June 24th at midnight, it will be available to the students beginning at 00:01 am, on June 22nd. Once the deadline of June 24th midnight is past, no assignments will be accepted, unless there are extenuating technical circumstances (failure of the servers, for example).

Failure on the student's side (any technology issues, e.g. not having internet access for a whole week while taking the class, for example) is NOT considered extenuating, as the student could find some other means of uploading their homework (for example, go to the library).

Assignment Policy

Students must stay current with all readings and discussions. Students must complete and submit all assignments by their respective due dates. Students are recommended to check their TAMUC email and D2L notifications at least once a day.

Late Work

We will not accept any assignment after its due date **unless you have confirmed with the instructor prior to the deadline.** Assignments submitted after the due date will receive a score of zero (0).

Drop a Course

Incompletes
