Course Description:

"My aim is not for production teams and readers to be more beholden to the text of all stage directions than they are to the play's dialogue, but simply that they are worth of sustained creative thought. Stage directions can be a playground instead of a prison, and my goal is to show how much potential and embodied agency lies inside of these underappreciated and underutilized portions of play texts." - Bess Rowen

The goal of this course is to examine the evolution of the director's role during the course of the 20th and 21st centuries. Since the director's vision of theatre cannot be realized except as part of a collaborative venue, the course will also include attention to acting theory and approaches to performance training. Such study should lead you to consider new perspectives and approaches in your future directing endeavors. Students will engage with written materials as a point of departure for considering issues relating to staging, performance, and the shifting roles of theatre artists. They will engage with these materials through in-class discussion, oral presentations, exercises, research, and written work.

Student Learning Outcomes: By the end of this course, the student will be able to:

- 1. display a learned knowledge of historical and contemporary use of stage directions
- 2. critically, knowledgably, and professionally evaluate and discuss varying types of stage directions their implementation in the directing process.
- 3. synthesize academic/artistic research into cohesive scholarly writing.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Instructional / Methods / Activities Assessments:

Active Participation: (20%)

Your Active Participation will play a substantial role in your final grade. As this is a seminar you will be expected to arrive in class ready to discuss the week's readings and participate in activities with your classmates. Attendance is mandatory for all classes with the exception of the final class period (July 4) when your final project is due. This grade will be taken for each class period and will involve your presence, discerned listening, as well as your willingness and ability to engage in the subject matter. Lack of demonstrable preparation will have a substantial negative impact on your course grade. Respect for yourself, your classmates, and your instructor are mandatory. Disagreements will happen, and we will approach them with kindness and respect.

Stage Directions in the Wild: (10%)

Each week we will begin the course sharing an example of stage directions found "in the wild." Explanation and instructions will be provided in class.

Talking Points: (30%)

Each student will complete six lucid and cogent talking points for each class meeting. These can be in whatever format you choose (bullet points usually work best) but should be questions and/or comments (anything that can assist with a class discussion) that struck you while reading. These will be due before you come to class, and you are encouraged to also bring this list with you.

Final Project: (40%)

The completion of an analysis of stage directions in a contemporary script that you would like to direct using Rowen's techniques. You will address the types of stage directions used and your concept for embodying them within a stage production. Further details will be provided in class but the grade for this assignment will include the approval of the script choice by June 9, a rough draft on June 23, and the final draft due on Tuesday, July 4 by midnight.

Minimal Technical Skills Needed

Students must have access to a computer and the ability to use Microsoft Word or other word processing software. Students must also be familiar with how to use the D2L Brightspace platform including uploading documents to Dropbox as .pdfs. Students must be able to use Power Point or Google Slides to create an effective presentation.

Instructional Methods

Students will be graded on a series of reading selections, class projects, practical application of the knowledge that they have learned, the completion of a paper applying the principals of Rowen's theory of the embodiment of stage directions.

Student Responsibilities or Tips for Success in the Course

- 1. Be prepared. Read what needs to be read. Write what needs to be written.
- 2. Participate. There is a great deal of exciting discussion in this course, and it will be even more exciting with your ideas.
- 3. Check your school e-mail regularly.
- 4. Be respectful of your instructor, your classmates, and yourself.

GRADING

GRADING SCALE: The following grading scale will be used to determine all individual grades as well as the student's overall grade in the course:
