Course Description

Music from 1600 to the death of Bach; styles, forms, and principal composers.

Student Learning Outcomes

Students will become familiar with practices and issues related to music during the Baroque period through exploration of topics such as institutions, music societies, patronage, and education.

Assessments

Participation: This course is based on in-person discussion and not lectures. Students are expected to come to class prepared to discuss assigned readings and pieces.

Transcription: Students will transcribe an excerpt of music in notation from the Baroque period into modern notation.

Response Essays: Students will write three response essays of 600-750 words that respond to assigned prompts. These essays require students to reflect on and engage critically with music and concepts discussed in class. Essay prompts and detailed instructions will be made available on D2L.
