Course Descriptions

MUS 151: Minor Applied. One to four semester hours. (1, 2) Private instruction for music majors in keyboard, voice, instruments, or composition. The course includes recitals and performance forums with teacher-directed student evaluations and instructions. May be repeated for credit.

Applied lessons will occur in the Music Building every week, unless prior arrangements have been made. Please be warmed up and on time. Lesson times will also be scheduled by the 2nd class day. Be fully prepared for each lesson: mentally, physically, technically. Please have all necessary materials. You will be expected to learn assigned repertoire.

Objective:

The syllabus/schedule are subject to change.

Flute lessons are designed to improve the basic fundamentals of flute playing and to expose the student to all extremes of musicianship. Lessons will assist students in the development of:

1. tone, 2. technical & rhythmical accuracy, 3. scales, 4. etudes, 5. solo repertoire, 6. orchestral excerpts, 7. mind and body awareness (physical and mental), and 8. performance skills.

Student Learning Outcomes

Upon completion of the baccalaureate curriculum:

MUS 149: Students will perform selected repertoire with technique and musicianship suitable for a non-major and appropriate to the student's musical and developmental level.

MUS 151: Students will perform selected repertoire with basic technique and musicianship suitable for a secondary performance medium.

MUS 351: Students will perform selected repertoire with basic to intermediate technique and musicianship suitable for a secondary performance medium.

MUS 551: Students will perform selected repertoire with intermediate to advanced level technique and musicianship suitable for a minor applied lesson at the graduate level.

<u>Majors</u>

MUS 152: In level one principal applied lessons, students will perform selected repertoire suitable to the student's musical development with intermediate technique and musicianship in preparation for the upcoming junior level proficiency exam. **MUS 352:** In level three principal applied lessons, students will perform selected repertoire suitable to the student's musical development with advanced technique and musicianship in preparation for the upcoming junior and/or senior recital. **MUS 552:** In level five principal applied lessons, graduate students will perform selected repertoire suitable to the student's musical development with professional level technique and musicianship in preparation for the upcoming graduate recital.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Instructional Methods

In-person, one-on-one applied music instruction.

Assessments

Grades are based on attendance, performance, preparedness, and progress. Students will be evaluated on a percentage basis from the following areas:

- 1. Weekly private lessons Student will receive a grade for each lesson. This includes having all necessary materials/books/music, scales, tone production, technique, etudes, orchestral excerpts, solo repertoire, and any special assignments designated by myself. Lessons will count for **50%** of the student's final semester grade.
- 2. Texas Summer Flute Symposium Participation: **50%** of the final semester grade.

Note: The instructor reserves the right to make exceptions and adjustments to the course policies on a case-by-case basis, to accommodate particular circumstances.

Attendance

Students are expected to attend all lessons. Absences from lessons will be made up at the discretion of the instructor. It is the student's responsibility to notify the instructor in advance of a legitimate absence, and to secure any assignments from instructor or other students. If you know that you must miss a lesson, please give me advanced notice (24 hours minimum via email or phone call) so that we can reschedule (if possible—make-ups are *not* guaranteed). Lessons missed due to student vacations taken during the term will not be made up. The only excuses for missing a lesson are illness and family emergencies. If you do not give me notification in advance, you will receive a "0" for the missed lesson. After 2 absences, your final grade may be dropped by one (1) full letter grade.

The applied instructor selects literature and plans lessons in a logical sequence specifically designed to prepare each student to meet the stated student learning outcomes. Thus, the literature and skills addressed in each lesson will vary according to each student's experience in performance repertoire and technical strengths and weaknesses. In practice, after assessing a student's skills and needs in the early lessons, the applied instructor often provides a more detailed overview of the semester's activities; however, this overview is specific to that student and the sequential activities are contingent upon that student's continued progress.
