Catalog Description

This course is designed for language learners who grew up speaking Spanish at home or in their community. They demonstrate, by taking the TAMUC Spanish Placement Exam, the CLEP exam or special permission from faculty, language abilities to understand and communicate in Spanish. The course capitalizes upon students' language skills to advance their bilingual proficiency and transcultural competence. Special attention is given to effective language learning strategies, critical analysis, and multimodal composition skills. Taught exclusively in Spanish, the course is for heritage or native speakers only.

Course Description

Heritage language learners are those individuals who are proficient in English and who grew up speaking another language at home; they can communicate, at some extend, in more than one language. The main purpose of the *Spanish for Heritage Speakers* courses at TAMUC is to build upon the language knowledge and cultural competence that students bring to the classroom and advance their bilingual proficiency and transcultural competence to successfully participate in different bi/multilingual contexts. Special attention is given to effective implementation of language learning strategies, critical analysis of Spanish language features, and development of multimodal composition skills. In addition, readings, podcasts, short films, research projects, and class discussions seek to advance learners' understanding of cultural issues related to the Hispanic communities, in the USA and abroad. Taught exclusively in Spanish, this course is designed for heritage or native speakers only.

Student Learning Outcomes

- Describe and analyze Spanish language features, considering issues of language variation and optionality in different registers and regional varieties.
- Compare and contrast English and Spanish language features, including main characteristics of US Spanish and translanguaging practices.
- Explore, describe and analyze diverse cultural topics related to language, identity, bilingualism, and Hispanic traditions.
- Effectively plan, design and present multimodal essays, incorporating written, visual and audiovisual information to communicate individual perspectives.

Collection of Data for Measuring Institutional Effectiveness:

GRADING

Core assessments

Multimodal projects (50% of the final grade). By the end of the semester you will complete two individual projects integrating all course material.

- a) Project I (25% of the final grade). The first project you will complete is a photo essay on the topic of "Bilingual life"; you will plan, design, create, and present the essay to the class. The photo essay will combine images, audiovisual and textual components, describing and narrating your personal perspectives and experiences on living as a bilingual person in the US. The project will be created through digital technologies. Please, refer to the "Proyecto 1 - Instructions" and "Rubrics" for detailed information.
- b) Project II (25% of the final grade). The second project is a formal report based on interviews with two people of Hispanic origin (family members, friends, neighbors, members of the community, etc.). You will be responsible for planning, conducting and recording the interview, and writing a report about the conversations. Please refer to the Proyecto 2 "Instructions" and "Rubrics" for more detailed information.

Fichas (18% of the final grade).

You will complete and edit four 'fichas' (reading comprehension guides) based on diverse readings. The "fichas" serve to supplement each unit topics, and they will allow you to: a) focus on and apply grammatical and lexical concepts learned in class; b) learn new vocabulary and expressions from diverse regions of the Spanish-speaking world; and c) express and support your ideas about the content. The 'fichas' will be evaluated according to *completeness* (every section must be completed in order to receive full credit), *language accuracy*, and *content elaboration*. Each "ficha" is expected to be completed and turned it in by the due date in the 'Fichas' section of *MyLeoOnline* (see Course Calendar for more information).

Tests (32% of the final grade)

You will complete four unit tests which will cover all work and materials revised on the unit; this include mandatory reading, vocabulary and grammar practice, translation exercises and other content revised in class.

Note: In addition to the graded assignments, each week there will specific assignments related to the language structure and functions (for instance, textbook activities on vocabulary, grammar, orthography, English-Spanish contrast analysis, etc.), and assignments related to the unit's cultural topics (supplementary readings, online research, podcasts, short film summaries, etc.). The responses to these activities will be presented and discussed in class. The assignments will measure your understanding of different concepts and prepare you for the tests and to create and edit the multimedia projects.
