COURSE INFORMATION

Materials: Text, Readings, Supplementary Readings

Readings:

All primary reading materials will be provided in this class via D2L, links to Open Educational Resources, etc. Additionally, I encourage you to put money aside to order scripts in conjunction with this class. You will need to review *many* scripts in order to select the script that you will use during this course. There are a number of reputable publishers and avenues to locate and acquire scripts. Please ask if you need some guidance in your search. This will be a good opportunity for you to begin (or continue) building your own script library as well.

Special Supplies:

Special supplies for the student to acquire consist of a three-ring binder, colored pencils or pins, and typing paper (three-hole punched).

Catalog Course Description:

The procedure and the problems involved in directing a play from selection of the script, auditions, and conducting rehearsals to the final production.

Student Learning Outcomes: By the end of this course, the participant will be able to

- 1. understand fundamental directorial principles.
- 2. apply quality directorial principles and concepts.
- 3. analyze and document choices and growth as a director.

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COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Instructional Methods/Activities/Assessments (tentative as of the posting of this syllabus)

Participation and Growth (25%):

Note that attendance alone does not constitute participation. Participation is vital in this class. This is an interactive environment and students must not only attend, but must also actively contribute to each class. You will not only be directing scenes, but you will be participating as actors in other class members' scenes, as well as engaging in daily in-class activities "up on your feet" based on required readings, etc.

Furthermore, the completion of miscellaneous homework assignments will also be considered part of your participation grade. There may be quite a few of these short assignments and they are all important in the development of your skills as a director. As well, participation in any ungraded quizzes to keep track of your level of understanding of directorial principles and concepts will also count toward this grade. Further, each student is required to attend at least one of the University Playhouse's season production this semester and scan in and out of the performance as evidence of attendance/successful audience member participation.

Positive, respectful and helpful attitudes are mandatory. *I would like to make this very clear: I will make every effort to treat you with the respect that I believe you deserve. You are also expected to treat your peers and myself with that same respectful attitude.* If I believe that a student is disrespectful, I will ask that person to leave the classroom. In this event, the student will receive a zero for any activities conducted that day in class and receive a zero for their participation grade for the day (no matter how long the student has been in class). Disrespect, rudeness, or negative attitudes will *substantially* lower the student's participation grade. The following are other reasons you would be asked to leave the class and receive a zero for the day's activities: sleeping in class, listening to headphones, reading the newspaper, working on other assignments, coming to class under the influence of any mind-altering substance not prescribed to you by a physician, or otherwise causing disruption or distraction during class (this includes cell phones going off and texting in class – turn them off when you come into the classroom and don't turn them on again until you leave). Finally, it should go without saying that missing a class and/or refusal to participate in any activity or part of an activity during class will result in a substantial and appropriate loss of participation points for the student.

Previous directing experience will not guarantee you a good grade in this course. Significant growth and a genuine attempt within the class will. This is a class that regards self-competition as a goal. You and your peers will arrive at various levels, and you will leave at different levels. However, growth from the beginning to the end of the semester can be evaluated. I challenge you to push yourself to grow and succeed. This class is concerned with developing *your* skills to the best of *your* ability. The community of the class is here to help all of us grow and expand our abilities.

Participation will be calculated daily and Growth reflected upon/tabulated at the end of the semester. Under normal circumstances, if you are scheduled to work with a partner(s) on a day you are absent, your participation grade will be reduced double the amount it normally would for an absence. Responsibility to the people you are working with is essential for success in this class. *Each student will begin with a mid-passing Participation and Growth grade of an 80.* Strong effort or lack of effort during each class and over the course of the semester as a whole.

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Measures Student Learning Outcomes #1, #2, and #3.

Directing Exercise Scene Presentations (50%):

You will direct and present three realistic scenes in this class, applying the fundamental principles studied. Scene Exercise #1 will be worth 15% of your final grade; Scene Exercise #2 will be worth 15% of your final grade; and the Final Scene Presentation will be worth 20% of your grade. More description will be offered in class at a later date.

Measures Student Learning Outcomes #1 and #2.

Final Class Portfolio (25%):

Your Final Class Portfolio will include, but not be limited to: Production Book elements, including directorial research, elements of analysis, elements of directorial planning and organization, documentation, etc. and a final self-reflection addressing individualized goals. These Final Class Portfolios will have elements developed and revised throughout the semester and will count as your Final Examination in this class. More description will be offered in class at a later date.

Measures Student Learning Outcomes #1, #2, and #3.

GRADING

Grading Scale:

The following grading scale will be used to determine all individual grades as well as the student's overall grade in the course:

A=90%-100% (Exceptional Quality Work); B=80%-89% (Good Quality Work); C=70%-79% (Average Quality Work); D=60%-69% (Below Average Quality Work); F=0%-59% (Fails to Meet Acceptable Expectations in Quality of Work)

Note: Numerical correlations for individual assignments receiving awarded letter grades in this class may be calculated as follows: A 95%; B 85%; C 75%; D 65%.
