Course Description

Introduction to Music Literature is designed for undergraduate students and deals with the characteristics of musical sound and the elements of music as found in the music of all of the world's cultures. Major emphasis will be given to active listening through recordings, live performances, reading about music, and organized discussions of the music heard.

Student Learning Outcomes

- 1. Identify musical works and elements in a variety of styles.
- 2. Analyze the elements and structures of music using appropriate terminology.
- 3. Critically evaluate the influence of social, political, technological, and/or cultural ideas in music.
- 4. Articulate the significance of music as an art form within historical, cultural, and social contexts.

Critical thinking: Students will be able to analyze, evaluate, or solve problems when given a set of circumstances, data, texts, or art.

Communication: In written, oral and/or visual communication, students will communicate in a manner appropriate/civil to audience and occasion, with an evident message and organizational structure.

Students will follow outlined activities for each week that include lecture videos, listening examples, required readings, and discussions. Some lecture videos have been created by Dr. Jessica Stearns, who is TAMUC's Music Department Musicologist, to enhance students' understanding of the curriculum.

To successfully complete the Introduction of Music Literature course, students should keep up with weekly course activities and complete assignments on time.

Assessments

Discussion and Listening Activities: 100 points of the final grade will be earned through Discussion and Listening Activities. There will be ten Discussion and Listening Activities over the course of the semester. For activities focused on discussion, students will post their own response and reply to one other student's post. You will receive five points for your post and five points for replying to another student's post for a total of ten points. When activities are focused on practicing listening skills, students will only be required to post their response for ten points.

Album Review: Students will write an essay reviewing an album of their choice.

Concert Report: Students will write an essay based on their attendance of a live concert featuring Western Art Music.

Exams: There will be three exams over the course of the semester that consist of listening identification and multiple-choice questions.

Grading: Grades will be posted within one week for Discussion and Listening Activities and within two weeks for the Album Review and Concert Report. Exams will be automatically graded.
