TEXAS GOVERNMENT PSCI 2306-03W Fall 2023

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COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course is a survey of the underlying ideas, principles, and participatory practices of constitutional government in Texas. Topics considered include political culture, ideology, parties, institutions, and demography.

FORMAT OF THE COURSE

This is a fully online class. You're required to follow the announcements and course requirements on D2L on a regular and timely basis. Study guides, lecture notes and PowerPoints can be found on D2L.

STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES

- Explain the origin and development of the Texas constitution.
- Describe state and local political systems and their relationship with the federal government.
- Describe separation of powers and checks and balances in both theory and practice in Texas.
- Demonstrate knowledge of the legislative, executive, and judicial branches of Texas government.
- Evaluate the role of public opinion, interest groups, and political parties in Texas.
- Analyze the state and local election process.
- Identify the rights and responsibilities of citizens.
- Analyze issues, policies and political culture of Texas.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Weekly Discussions: Every week, there will be a discussion forum on D2L on a topic relevant to that week's reading material. Your contributions to the weekly discussion forum are due every Sunday, 11.59 pm. Discussion posts must be about 250-300 words, concise, and to the point. You must make relevant connections to class material within your post. You won't get full credit if you use fillers (irrelevant statements) in your posts just to reach the required word count.

Exams: You will have 5 exams. Each exam will be composed of 30 multiple-choice questions. You will be able to take the exams online through D2L. Exams won't be cumulative; they will be timed and must be completed in one sitting. Study guides will be provided. Exam dates can be found on the course schedule.

Critical Op-ed: The "op-ed", or opinion paper, is a classic form of essay which is meant to express well-informed, well-articulated opinions for publication in the editorial pages of newspapers. Opeds are subjective pieces and reflect the author's personal opinion on a particular topic, but the author is responsible for backing his/her opinions with facts and evidence. A well-written op-ed must be concise while still being comprehensive.

To complete the op-ed assignment, students are required to write a critical opinion piece on a topic of their choice which must be relevant to Texas Government and Politics. Op-eds are expected to be 750-1000 words in length, double-spaced, written with Times New Roman, 12-point font. The deadline for submitting the op-ed is **December 14, 11.59 pm** on D2L.
