COURSE INFORMATION

Course Description

Three semester hours. A continuation of the detailed study of financial accounting principles and procedures begun in Accounting 321. Emphasis will be given to accounting for long-term liabilities and investments, stockholders equity, income recognition, leases, accounting changes and errors, and financial reporting and analysis. Prerequisites: ACCT 321.

Your achievement level for each objective will be measured by your success in completing the homework, quizzes and examinations.



ASSESSMENTS

Accounting is a very challenging topic and requires a lot of practice. The weekly assignments due on the schedule below are key parts of this course and critical to your success. These assignments are to be completed In D2L and WileyPlus.

Homework

Read and outline the chapter before attempting homework. Homework assignments are worth 10 points each. The purpose of the graded homework is to practice concepts at a higher level of difficulty. Assignments are due in **WileyPlus** by **9:00pm** on **Sunday** of that week. They have no time limit and **two** attempts.

Quizzes

The purpose of chapter quizzes is to give you feedback as to how much material you retained and mastered in preparation for the exams. Quizzes are worth 5 points each due in **WileyPlus** every **Sunday** midnight with a duration of 30 minutes and <u>one</u> attempt.

Exams

This course requires two (2) midterm exams and a final exam. Exams are worth 100 points each. See the Course Calendar for a detailed breakdown of the exam dates.

Make-up exams will be considered only under extenuating circumstances. The following are considered extenuating circumstances: hospitalization, medical emergency, physical injury or death of an immediate family member. You will be **required to provide** proof of the extenuating circumstance in order to be approved for a make-up exam. Make-up exams will be scheduled within three days of approval.
