Course Description

A general survey of the sociology of race and ethnicity in the United States. Emphasis is placed on how race operates within societal structures, including education, politics, and housing.

- 1. Explain what sociologists mean when we say that race is a social construct
- 2. Identify how race has shaped (or been shaped by) historical, political, and economic forces
- 3. Recognize how racial inequality operates within larger social structures
- 4. Describe a racial democracy perspective and how it compares to other perspectives on race and racism
