Course Description

CJ 516 – Counterintelligence

Hours: 3

This course will introduce the students to the concept of counterintelligence (CI) and its importance in the U.S. today. This course will examine various aspects of CI including what is CI, CI operations (both offensive and defensive), case studies, and CI in the age of the internet.

Student Learning Outcomes

1. Understand the concept of counterintelligence.
2. Understand the importance of counterintelligence in the US today.
3. Demonstrate familiarity with various aspects of counterintelligence definitions and application.
4. Demonstrate familiarity with counterintelligence in the age of the Internet.
5. Apply counterintelligence concepts to select case studies.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Minimal Technical Skills Needed

The course is delivered online through the MyLeo platform. Microsoft Office tools are used to submit activity attachments. Attachments, when required, must be in Word .doc or .docx format.

Instructional Methods

The course is delivered online.

Student Responsibilities or Tips for Success in the Course

This course is fast-paced and it may require more work within a week than initially expected. Five-week online courses require that you do the amount of work normally conducted over a full semester within a compressed period of time. Doing so successfully requires specific attention and commitment. Students are expected to read all assigned material. It is also expected that students will submit all deliverables on time. This course starts on a Monday and ends on a Friday. Week 5 activity due dates are not aligned with weekly due dates found in the earlier sections. After submitting an attachment in the online courseroom, please check the submission for Word formatting and to make sure the submission took. If there is no submission there for you, there is no submission there for me. If it is not in Word .doc or .docx, I may not be able to open it. A submission that is not attached or not capable of being opened is the same as no submission. Regarding Discussion Forums, submissions must be in the textbox rather than as an attachment. Attachments in the Discussion Forum are too hard to follow and are not appropriate for that venue. I have provided an example of a correctly written APA 6th style reference through the way I wrote the textbook information in this Syllabus. The ISBN is for course purposes and is not part of the reference. You may alternatively use APA 7th in this course. The textbook or other assigned instructional material needs to be used as the first student resource for all substantive information and needs to be correctly cited and referenced in discussion forums, assignments, and exams. It is not acceptable to discuss information in this course in discussion forums, assignments, or exams without building off the assigned textbook or other assigned

instructional material. This course cannot be successfully completed without using the assigned textbook and other assigned instructional material.

GRADING

Final grades in this course will be determined in the following manner:

A = 900-1000 Points

B = 800-899 Points

C = 700-799 Points

D = 600-699 Points

F = 0-599 Points

The course grading scheme is points based, rather than proportion or percentage based, thus final grades will not be rounded. A level threshold is either reached or it is not. For example, 895 points is 895 points. It is five points shy of the next threshold. It is not 89.5 percent and therefore does not round up to 90% or 900 points. The same principle applies to 896, 897, 898, and 899, as well as all of the other various combinations within the listed points scheme.

Assessments

1. Chapter Summary Essay: The Chapter Summary Essay represents your understanding of the assigned instructional material. You will submit in the online courseroom one essay for each textbook chapter or other assigned instructional material. Instructional material forms the basis for discussion board posts and course assignments, and they must be completed prior to any other activity in the course during the designated week. Chapter Summary Essays are due by Wednesday 11:59 pm central during Weeks 1-4. Each week comprises multiple chapters. Essays must be a

minimum of 250 words and must follow APA style for in-text citations and references. The textbook must be used, cited, and referenced. You may use and cite additional references as needed. Please see the General Grading Rubric prior to submission. Please see the listed section for information regarding the course Late Work policy. Please see the online courseroom submission area for further instructions. Please format your attachment in Word .doc or .docx. Please double check that what you intended to attach is indeed attached, and that it is in the required format. If an extension reads anything other than .doc or .docx, I may not be able to open it. A submission that is not attached or not capable of being opened is treated the same as not being submitted.

2. Discussion Board Initial Essays and Peer Response Essays:

Discussion Board Initial Posts follow Chapter Summary Essays and they are due by Friday 11:59 pm central of each module, during Weeks 1-4. Each week comprises multiple chapters or other assigned instructional material readings. Timely submission is expected in order to meet objectives of participation, allowing the course professor and peer students an opportunity to read your work, ask questions or ask for clarification, when needed, and to otherwise engage in a dialogue with you. Discussion Board essays must be a minimum of 150 words and must follow APA style for in-text citations and references. The textbook must be used, cited and referenced in each post. In addition to citing the textbook and other relevant course instructional material, you must find, read, and cite at least two additional scholarly articles to support your essay. Said another way, each post requires at least three citations and corresponding references. The additional sources cannot be ones found in the courseroom. Please see the Grading Rubric prior to submission for further information. Please see the listed section for information regarding the course Late Work policy. Please see Discussion Forum for further instructions. Please submit your Discussion Forum posts in the Discussion Box, rather than as an attachment.

Discussion Board Peer Response essays are due by Sunday 11:59 pm central of each module during Weeks 1-4. You must respond to at least two student initial posts in a manner that moves the discussion forward. Simple agreement posts will not be graded. Timely submission is expected in order to meet objectives of participation, allowing the course professor and peer students an opportunity to read your work, ask questions or ask for clarification, when needed, and to otherwise engage in a dialogue with you. Participation by definition cannot occur when a window for such has passed. A course module starts on Monday and ends on Sunday, except for Week 5 which ends on Friday. Discussion Board Peer Response posts will not be accepted or graded after a module has closed. Discussion Board Initial posts and Peer Response posts are graded together, representing participation. Discussion essays are worth a total of 300 points (30%) toward the course grade. Discussion Board Peer Response essays must be a minimum of 50 words and must follow APA style for in-text citations and references. For each Discussion Board Peer response posted in the courseroom, you must find, read, and cite at least one additional scholarly article to support your peer response essay that was not used in the initial peer post. The additional source cannot be from

instructional material in the courseroom. It is likely you will also have to read and cite the sources used in the initial peer post, as well as the textbook or other assigned readings. Please see the Grading Rubric prior to submission for further information. Please see the listed section for information regarding the course Late Work policy. Please see the Discussion Forum for further instructions. Please submit your Discussion Forum posts in the Discussion Box, rather than as an attachment.

3. Research Paper Topic Selection:

The Research Paper Topic Selection assignments is due Week 1 by Sunday 11:59 pm central. Please use the Research Paper description to identify and propose a suitable topic. The Research Paper Topic Selection assignment will be graded as Acceptable or Not Acceptable. The Research Paper Topic Selection assignment must follow APA style for in-text citations and references. Please double check that what you intended to attach is indeed attached, and that it is in the required format. If an extension reads anything other than .doc or .docx, I may not be able to open it. A submission that is not attached or not capable of being opened is the same as not being submitted. Please see the Research Paper instructions prior to submission. Please see the course section for further information regarding the Late Work policy.

4. Research Paper:

This course requires a research paper. The Research Paper is due in the online courseroom in Module 5 by Monday 11:59 pm central. You will prepare an 8-12 page research paper that provides you with an opportunity to more fully explore course issues, examining a narrow aspect of the course material in an in-depth and focused way. For this paper, please restrict your broad topic to one of the following: 1) History of Law Enforcement Intelligence and Contemporary Counterintelligence. 2) Collection of Information and Intelligence Analysis. 3) Technological Issues and Developments in Contemporary Counterintelligence. 4) Legal Issues and Counterintelligence. 5) Police Counterintelligence Role in Terrorism. You may approach the topic in a manner you see fit, which you will describe in the Topic Selection Assignment. For the paper, you will obtain at least five outside scholarly articles for a substantive topic discussed in the textbook. Please use the textbook Index to inform selection of your topic. The paper should examine your selected topic in-depth, aligning the examination with the student learning outcomes identified in the syllabus. If your intended topic does not relate well to the stated student learning objectives, then it is not an acceptable topic. A suitable topic will align with the stated course outcomes. The paper must follow the APA Publication Manual 6th Edition or APA Publication Manual 7th Edition in respect to double-spacing and 12-point font, as well as inclusion of title page, abstract, level one, two, and three headings, in-text citations, and a reference section. The paper must contain a minimum of 8 pages of content, which does not include front matter (Title Page and Abstract) or back matter (Reference section or appendices). The paper should not exceed 12 pages, as the idea is to present your deep understanding of the material in an efficient manner. Papers that do not meet the minimum 8 page count will not meet minimum standards for this assignment. In order to meet the minimum 8 page count, content that starts on page 1, is double-spaced with 12-point font, will end somewhere on page 9 or later. A paper that ends on page 8 of content is a 7+ page paper, not an 8+ page paper. Papers

that exceed 12 pages of content may be penalized. A Table of Contents is not appropriate for this assignment. There are many ways to approach the idea of level one, two, and three headings, which will vary from paper to paper. The paper being written in this course is called a *literature review paper* compared in contrast to another type of paper, called a *scientific paper*. As a general scheme for a *scientific paper*, it is common to think of the level one headings as Abstract, Introduction, Literature Review, Methods, Results, Discussion, Conclusion, and References. The general scheme for a *literature review paper* differs a little. Here is the required format for this paper in regard to level 1 headings: Title Page, Abstract, Introduction, Literature Review, Discussion, Conclusion, and References. Level two headings within those sections will be derived from the content you are presenting, usually representing the main idea of your subsection. Level three headings are not always needed. When they are used, level three headings divide level two headed material into smaller, more digestible areas of focus. The paper must be saved as a Word document and submitted in the online courseroom. The Research Paper is due in Week 7 by Tuesday at 11:59 pm central. Please see the Grading Rubric prior to submission for further information. Please see the Course Requirements section for information regarding the Late Work policy. Please format your attachment in Word .doc or .docx. Please double check that what you intended to attach is indeed attached, and that it is in the required format. If an extension reads anything other than .doc or .docx, I may not be able to open it. A submission that is not attached or not capable of being opened is the same as not being submitted.

Course Specific Procedures/Policies

Regular attendance is essential. Each module comprises instructional tasks and homework activities that are completed throughout the module, each building upon and depending upon the other. All work is expected to be completed and submitted on time, within the specified module.

All written work should demonstrate graduate level writing without spelling, grammar and formatting errors. All Essays, Assignments, Exams, and the Research Paper should be proofread and corrected prior to submission. This may take several on-your-own draft revisions to accomplish. Points will be deducted for grammar and spelling errors.

All course essays and written papers must adhere to the guidelines described in the Publication Manual of the American Psychological Association (APA), 6th ed. All citations and references must adhere to APA style or points will be deducted for improper use of APA format or no use at all. The APA publication manual can be purchased on-line from such companies as Amazon.com and elsewhere. In-text citation and a corresponding reference section line item is required in academic writing for all statements of fact, either to show who is being paraphrased (attribution citation) or to show the source used to draw your own independent conclusion (evidence citation), as well as being required for direct quotes, something that should be used sparingly, if at all, in graduate level writing. Using APA style properly is simply a matter of obtaining the APA Publication Manual and matching in-text citations or reference section line items against the examples. If they do not match exactly for capitalization, italics, punctuation, etc..., then they are not correct.

Submitted work for this course is expected to be original work by the student, prepared specifically for this course, not using work from previous courses without express professor permission. Submitted work is additionally expected to be prepared without aid from other persons, including other students; other faculty; or the use of Artificial Intelligence, ChatBots, or other software that has the capacity to generate text, or suggest replacements of text beyond individual words. Please see the Academic Integrity section for further information. When in doubt, please ask for clarification in advance.

Late Work: All work in this course is submitted in an online courseroom, with a week starting on Monday at 12:00 am central and ending on Sunday at 11:59 pm central, except for the last day of the course in Week 5 which ends on a Friday.

Discussion Board Initial Posts will be accepted if submitted after the Friday 11:59 pm central due date but prior to the close of the module on Sunday at 11:59 pm central, with an 11% late penalty. No special permission is needed to take advantage of this late submission. Discussion Board Initial posts will not be accepted or graded after a week has closed. Discussion Board Peer Response posts will not be accepted or graded after a week has closed.

Assignments and Exams may be submitted with penalty up to 72 hours following the due date. The courseroom submission area will remain open for 72 hours after a due date, and there is no need to ask for specific permission to submit during that time. An Assignment or Exam submitted one minute or more up to 24 hours after the due date will be assessed a 10% point penalty. An Assignment or Exam submitted more than 24 hours and less than 48 hours after the due date will be assessed a 20% point penalty. An Assignment or Exam submitted more than 48 hours and less than 72 hours after the due date will be assessed a 30% point penalty. Assignments and Exams will not be accepted or graded later than 72 hours following their due date. Assignments and Exams will not be accepted or graded after the last day of the course.

All work must be submitted prior to the end of the course. Late work cannot be accepted or graded after the course has ended. The university submission deadlines for course grades from professors is too tight for that.

Evaluation of each unit will be completed by the professor periodically throughout the semester. There is no set schedule for the receipt of graded work.
