Course Purpose: Welcome to PLS 326 Lab! This lab will provide you hands-on learning experiences to familiarize yourself with a selection of forage species, their pests, and their growth habits.

Course Text: None required. All materials will be furnished through print outs or D2L.

Learning Objectives

- Understand the importance of management decisions in forage success
- Identify common forage and pasture crops used across the US
- Identify common insects, diseases, and weeds in forage and pasture crops
- Describe pest management methods used in the Southern US in forage and pasture crops

Course Work

ID Quizzes: 6-8 quizzes will be given throughout the semester. 110 points worth of quizzes will be available throughout the semester, only 100 points count toward final grade. Quizzes may be given during lab with live plant/seed examples or via D2L with picture/diagram examples.

Lab report: One lab report will be assigned over lab 1- planting depth. Instructions for what is expected to be included in your lab report, deadlines for submission, and formatting requirements are included in the initial handout labeled “Lab 1”. This handout will be provided during lab on January 10 and posted on D2L under the “Week 1” module. This lab report must be typed and turned into D2L via a word or PDF file.

Lab assignments: Lab assignments will be assigned for each lab period and will be worth 25 points each, with potential for up to 15 total bonus points. Lab assignments will vary per week. Week 1 lab assignment is to turn in page 4 of your lab 1 handout before leaving lab.

Lab Practical: One lab practical (exam) will be administered worth 100 points. The lab practical will be given during class time on March 6th. The practical will include written & hands-on materials/demonstrations from weeks 1-8. You may bring a writing utensil and a calculator.
