

Syllabus Spring 2024
Minor and Elective Applied Voice MUS 151 section 1 and MUS 149 section 1
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Course Objective:

Courses in applied voice are designed to build technical and interpretive skills in singing.

Music and Materials:

Repertoire will be assigned according to proficiency level. **PLAN TO BUY MUSICAL SCORES.** Vocal exercises, designed to build the voice, will be prescribed from the historical pedagogical vocalise repertoire. **STUDENTS ARE ENCOURAGED TO USE A RECORDING DEVICE (i.e. SMART PHONE) TO RECORD LESSONS.** A collaborative pianist will be assigned to you after you complete an accompanist request form. Students **MUST** have an accompanist. All vocal repertoire is accompanied. You must then provide payment for them and copies of your assigned literature.

Other Relevant Information:

Studio class will meet on Monday at 5:00 PM. Studio class performance is compulsory. Attendance is not compulsory for minors and electives. Minors must perform a minimum of two separate times in studio class.

Students who are performing in studio class must dress appropriately. You should dress as if you are performing for convocation, your jury or a competition. Don't forget that you also need to supply translations for foreign language pieces. We've been doing that via GroupMe or group text message. I will remind you of both of these rules, but it's ultimately your responsibility. Your pianist may not be playing for our studio class on the day that you are performing. Please bring a score for the pianist if you are performing. Do not assume they play from a digital score. Bring a hard copy of it form them.

Course Policy:

1. *Repertoire study*

Students will be assigned 3 pieces of repertoire. One will be in a foreign language. You will submit repertoire study guides and a translation for all assigned literature **two times** during the semester.

2. *Juries*

Juries are **May 6 and May 7**. All applied voice students are required to perform a jury exam. All music must be memorized for jury exams. Consult the Vocal Studies Handbook for other questions concerning juries.

DUE DATES AND CONTENT REQUIREMENTS FOR STUDY GUIDES AND TRANSLATIONS :

1st- week of **March 4-8** (due by the day of your lesson and **submitted in hard copy format**):

1. translation form for the foreign language song or aria

2. scans of your handwritten translation in your score and

3. study guide for your foreign language song or aria should all be submitted in hard copy format.

2nd- May 6 & 7- remaining 2 study guides should be submitted in hard copy format by the day of your jury.

Methods for Evaluating Progress:

1. Weekly lesson grades (35%)

a. lesson attendance and punctuality (make up lessons for approved excuse only)

b. preparation- one new piece of literature thoroughly prepared for every lesson beginning with the second lesson. Melodies and rhythms should be sung accurately. Languages are sung using correct pronunciation and articulation. If you have had the diction course for a language you should be able to make correct pronunciation choices without my aid. If you have not had the diction course we will spend time on pronunciation in the lesson.

c. displayed progress made with technical concepts from previous lessons

d. accurate learning and memorization of assigned repertoire

This portion of the grade is assessed in the studio class performances and convocation. The dates for convocation performances are usually scheduled within the first two weeks of classes. I will have more info on that for you shortly. Convocation and studio class performances should be from memory.

2. Repertoire study guides and translations (25%)

3. jury (40%)

Engagement in this course is the student's responsibility. Students are expected to fully participate in the course. If, for any reason, you, the student, are not able to complete assignments or actively engage in the course, you must contact me.
