Course Description

A broad interdisciplinary course in the historical development of the United States and North America to 1877. Assignments will focus on reading, writing, and analysis. Prerequisites: ENG 1301 or concurrent enrollment or ENG 1302 or concurrent enrollment.

Course Objectives:

1. Analyze how the pursuit of economic, social, and religious liberty led to the colonization of the Americas and the impact it had on the liberty of American Indians and Africans;

- 2. Contrast the concepts of liberty in the colonial societies of New England and the Chesapeake;
- 3. Analyze how a lack of political and economic liberty led to the American Revolution, the creation of the Constitution, and an evolving democracy that expanded liberty to more Americans:
- 4. Contrast how westward expansion expanded economic liberty for white Americans, while empowering the expansion of slavery.
- 5. Contrast the arguments for and against slavery and the expansion of slavery through the Civil War and Reconstruction

Student Learning Outcomes (Should be measurable; observable; use action verbs)

- 1. Students will be able to analyze, evaluate, or solve problems when given a set of circumstances, data, texts, or art.
- 2. In written, oral, and/or visual communication, A&M-Commerce students will communicate in a manner appropriate to the audience and occasion, with an evident message and organizational structure.
- 3. Students will understand and practice academic honesty.
- 4. Students will demonstrate awareness of societal and/or civic issues.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Student Responsibility Sheet:

The purpose of the Student Responsibility Sheet is to assess the student's role in their education. It will be assigned through the D2L portal.

Students are expected to turn all work in on time.

Exams:

Students will complete four multiple choice exams during the semester. The exam questions will come from the lecture questions provided for each class session. The exams are not cumulative. The exams will be completed in the D2L portal. The due dates for the exams are listed in the course outline at the end of the syllabus.

Response Papers:

Students will complete four 300 word response papers that connect the primary source readings, news readings, and news videos to the lecture notes. The response papers will be submitted through the D2L portal. The due dates for the response papers are listed in the course outline at the end of the syllabus.

Biographical Essay:

One biographical essay will be assigned for this course. Students will choose one historical figure from the time frame of the course and write a three to five page essay that argues why that person is important in studying American history. The essay must focus on the impact of the individual and contain valid arguments backed up by research cited according to the Works Cited handout that will be provided. Components of the essay will be submitted throughout the semester. Due dates are listed in the course outline at the end of the syllabus; guidelines for the topic, bibliography, rough draft, and final draft will appear on supplementary handouts. The components of the essay will be submitted through the D2L portal.

Minimal Technical Skills Needed

Students will need the technical ability to navigate the D2L portal and the word procession skills needed to type up an essay.

Instructional Methods

Students must log into their MyLeo account and access the class through the D2L portal using their CWID. The CWID is the student's campus-wide identification number that they should have received when they were accepted to the university. If students have trouble logging in, they should contact the tech support listed on the login page. The instructor is not tech support.

In the D2L portal, students will find materials posted for each class session. Students will use the lecture notes to answer the assigned lecture questions. Students will read primary sources, read news articles, and/or watch news clips and compare them to the lecture notes.

Students will meet during the scheduled class times to discuss the material assigned for that class day.
