COURSE INFORMATION

Course Description

This course is a hands-on study of the basic principles involved in training and showing of the versatile western stock horse in **collegiate stock horse competitions**.

Materials needed- Good fitting pair of riding boots and comfortable pair of jeans/pants to ride in. I also recommend that you bring water to class in case of hot weather.

Textbook: Stock Horse of Texas and American Stock Horse Association Rulebooks

Optional Texts and/or Materials: Various resources that will be provided throughout the semester.

Corequisites: EQSC 335 Lab

Prerequisites: Previous riding experience, **or** experience showing in SHOT or ASHA events, **or** instructor approval. **EQSC 140, EQSC 220, and EQSC 241 if you do not have previous riding or showing experience.**

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Basic Riding Skills Needed

The student in this course should have a basic understanding of proper western equitation. They should be comfortable riding in a western saddle at a walk, trot, and lope. They should be able to distinguish which lead the horse is on at all times. They should have an independent seat and understand the use of their hands and legs in proper equitation.

They can elect to use a horse that they own themselves or they may use a University owned horse. If electing to use a horse of their own, the horse should be able to walk, trot, and lope both directions easily and confidently. They should be able to pick up either lead upon request, and have the basics of shoulder control, hip control, and the sidepass established. The horse should also be broke enough to allow a basic level of collection when going forward through up and downward transitions, stopping, and backing.

SAFETY is the #1 priority for labs, if I tell you to do something for your safety or the safety of others, do it and do not question me! I will let you know when it is safe to challenge your skill level.

The syllabus/schedule are subject to change.

Appropriate Clothing:

1. Riding boots with a riding heel. Examples will be given the first day of class.
2. Loose fitting jeans or long pants. No shorts or skirts.
3. An appropriate shirt. No tank-tops. No oversized hoodies will be allowed.
4. Jackets or coats in cooler weather. I will not provide you with a coat if you show up without one and get cold.
5. You will be required to wear a safety helmet when riding. (TAMUC will provide a helmet to all students, but you may use your own approved riding helmet if you wish.) We will discuss proper equipment and fit of saddles in the first two weeks.
6. You may wish to bring a water source with you to class.
7. **DO NOT** carry your cell phone on your person when we are riding. Also please remove earrings and jewelry that may be lost when riding.

Instructional Methods

We will spend our time in lecture discussing horse training theory and techniques that will be useful for competition in Collegiate Stock Horse shows. We will learn the rules governing SHOT and ASHA competitions and discuss tack and equipment in the lecture portion as well. We will spend our lab time applying the principles discussed in the lecture. The labs will cover the four classes in a Stock Horse competition. We may meet at designated times outside of the course for team practices either here at the TAMUC Equine Center or at outside facilities.

Student Responsibilities or Tips for Success in the Course

The student should understand that attendance is mandatory for a passing grade. The student will be expected to attend and participate in all lecture and labs. The student will be expected to ask questions in discussion and complete quizzes over the rulebooks and lecture material. Above all other requirements the student is expected to come to class with an open mind and willingness to learn. Safety is of the utmost importance and a disregard for the safety of themselves and other students will not be tolerated.

The first few days will be spent evaluating the riding skills of the students, as well as, the performance level of horses used in the course and discussion of expectations of the level of care each horse needs. Students can elect to use a horse that they own themselves, or they may use a University owned horse. If electing to use a horse of their own, the horse should be able to walk, trot, and lope both directions easily and confidently. They should be able to pick up either lead upon request, and have the basics of shoulder control, hip control, and the sidepass established. The horse should also be broke enough to allow a basic level of collection when going forward through up and downward transitions, stopping, and backing.

The class will meet at the TAMUC Equine Center Arena. The instructor will take roll each and every class period at the beginning of class. Students who show up after roll has been taken will receive an unexcused absence for that class period. It is the **student's responsibility** to contact the instructor **prior to** an absence if at all possible.

Each student will ride and practice maneuvers in order to advance both the student's and animal's levels of proficiency, comfort, and confidence. The skills will be presented in progressive sequence in that mastery of each skill is necessary for it will be incorporated into future maneuvers. **Therefore attendance is imperative.**

I will maintain a gradebook in the D2L LMS version of the course. You should be able to access this at any time, throughout the semester. If you should have questions about your grade, check the D2L Gradebook first, then contact the instructor. You are expected to take all quizzes and complete discussions in the D2L LMS and will be held accountable for not doing so. I will post quizzes and discussion topics each week in D2L and you will be responsible for answering all quiz questions and discussions.
