Course Description

An overview of the American juvenile justice system with an emphasis on contemporary themes of its different aspects including school violence and drugs. It will explore the juvenile justice system from arrest through intake, prosecution, adjudication and

dispositions. It will also cover the organization, processes, and functions of the juvenile justice system in the United States, its historical antecedents and contemporary challenges. Consideration is also given to sociopolitical factors in juvenile justice decision-making including the surveys of juvenile law and a comparative analysis of adult and juvenile justice systems.

Student Learning Outcomes

After completing this course, students should be able to:

1. Apply a sociological and criminal justice perspective on juvenile justice in America;

2. Explain theories regarding causes of juvenile offending;

3. Recognize current practice and procedure for handling juvenile offenders and the types of treatment modalities and interventions used historically and currently with a clear understanding of what is considered to be successful and what is not in curbing delinquent behavior;

4. Apply critical thinking skills to the problem of delinquency and express their ideas in written and oral communication;

5. Use critical thinking skills to assess current trends in the juvenile justice system and how it has changed over time.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Instructional Methods

The method of instruction for this course will be a combination of discussions, PowerPoints and reading from the text. The specific activities used to engage students in mastering chapter material will be discussion board participation, exams and a course project as assigned.

Assessments

Exams: You will have <u>4 exams</u> during the course (each exam is worth 100 points). The exams, in general, will not be cumulative, however some of the material presented later in the course builds on topics previously discussed. Exams are to be taken on the date listed on the syllabus. Each examination will consist of short essay questions. You may prepare for these exams by reviewing reading assignments, class notes and discussion questions. Please know that a short essay is not 1-3 sentences. It is a well thought out answer in 2-3 good paragraphs. You should also cite any sources used to answer these questions. Please note anything on your schedule in red is related to your exams.

<u>Online Discussions</u>: We are going to integrate some of our learning into online discussion. Please, make sure you are familiar with all aspects of D2L. There is an online tutorial if there is something you do not understand. Not understanding D2L is not an acceptable excuse for late assignments. Start now getting familiar with it. <u>For full credit of 20 points</u>, you will need to post an original post that is cited correctly (APA) and answer <u>TWO</u> of your classmates with a reply which consists of more than "I agree or I disagree".

Final Research Project: The research project will be a course project due at the end of the semester. It is not to be an argumentative or opinion project, but a research project. This project must be created based on information and analysis of a juvenile delinquent. Please, use APA format writing style for this project. The project will be a Power Point presentation and will be a minimum of 12 slides long NOT to include the title slide or the references slide. You will have deadlines to meet throughout the course with reference to this research project. You will need to turn in the topic for approval. There is a date on your syllabus when you will turn this in. You will need to turn in a literature review which should include 3-5 sources that you plan on using in your project. This will be your final exam as well. Please watch the dates for turning in research related information.

<u>Reading Assignments</u>: You will have reading assignments weekly throughout the semester. You are assigned chapters from the text each week.

You are encouraged to monitor your grades throughout the semester via the grade book in D2L. If you turn in an assignment and do not receive a grade or have a question about the grading, I need to know immediately. I will not entertain any disputes later than one week after the grades are posted.
