Course Description

This course is a survey of the underlying ideas, principles, and participatory practices of constitutional government in Texas. Topics considered include political culture, ideology, parties, institutions, and demography.

Student Learning Outcomes

- Explain the origin and development of the Texas constitution.
- Describe state and local political systems and their relationship with the federal government.
- Describe the separation of powers and checks and balances in both theory and practice in Texas.

- Demonstrate knowledge of the legislative, executive, and judicial branches of the Texas government.
- Evaluate the role of public opinion, interest groups, and political parties in Texas.
- Analyze the state and local election process.
- Identify the rights and responsibilities of citizens.
- Analyze issues, policies, and political culture of Texas.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Minimal Technical Skills Needed

Using the learning management system, using Microsoft Word and PowerPoint, using presentation and graphics programs, etc.

Instructional Methods

The class will be a mix of lectures, debates, and group activities. An outline of the reading schedule is provided in this syllabus. Students are required to come to class prepared to discuss the assigned materials. In addition to the assigned readings, we may also discuss current political events, since developments in Texas politics occur on a daily basis.

Have the chapter notes read prior to class time.

Grading Policy

Grades are based on seven quizzes, a comprehensive final, four papers, a photo essay project/ & misc. assignments.

Deadlines are deadlines; so make them. The instructor has the discretion of final grades.

Quizzes – (50%) seven quizzes 7.14% each. The quizzes will be multiple choice/true and false questions, 50 questions, the quizzes are taken online. On each quiz, several questions can be based strictly on classroom lectures, videos, etc. not covered in the study guides. You need access to a computer and a flash drive

Comprehensive final- (10%) 100 multiple-choice, true, and false questions over the 14 chapters. Each chapter will have roughly 7 questions.

***Papers-** (20%) four papers 05% each. Topics will be assigned.—there will be specific due dates. Stay with the instruction. Please contact a Reference and Learning Librarian for help, 903.886.5714.

Project / Photo Essay (10%) **(Solo or Group Project)** If possible, do this in a group. Choose a Texas theme. Some suggestions: Texas stereotypes, a film about Texas, a Texas musician, Texas music, Texas Capitol, a battle, a political leader, a military leader, a Texas hero, Texas Native Americans, Texas Folklore, a county, a city, a region, a river, cattle, a mineral (oil and gas industry), state parks, forts, wildlife, ethnic group, Texas Republican or Texas Democrat Parties, sports, such as football, a university; or a choice approved by the professor. This project is divided into two parts. In **Part one**, in ten slides or more, you will tell your story in primarily images (based on your topic) with some script. Your images should present your theme. Have a beginning, a middle, an arc, and an end. In other words, you are using your images—a kind of rhetoric—to tell a story about your theme. It is like a trailer to a movie, building an interest in your theme. This showcase piece takes effort, time, especially planning, and critical thinking about the concept/Theme. What is your message? Remember – be creative. **Part II.** In 500 to 750 words, (2-3 pages (slides) in paragraph form you will summarize your topic.

If you decided to be a part of a group. If time permits, volunteers will present their findings to the class. Each volunteer(s) will decide the format of the presentation, e.g., by power point, by lecture, by debate, by panel discussion, by a mock trial... Each member of the group will be assigned a specific task, and that will be decided by the group itself. Each group will need a (1) group leader, (2) researchers, (3) presenters, (4) organizer, (Find out who does what BEST. Part of the objective of this assignment is group interaction; the objective, working in groups (team work). If you join a group, and become deadweight, your group can expel you from the group, as you are no use to them

Miscellaneous assignments (10%) four assignments of various themes, each assignment is worth 2.5% each.

Pop quizzes Be prepared for each class meeting, so you need notebook paper and pencils/pens.
