Course Description

Catalog: A study of selected works of fiction, poetry, and drama in the literature of western civilization from classical times to the present. Authors covered may include Sophocles, Virgil, Dante, Voltaire, Goethe, Dostoevsky, Tolstoy, Mann, and Eliot. Prerequisite: ENG 1302.

Spring 2024 Emphasis: This course will be a study of literature from antiquity through the modern era. While the time frame that we will cover is quite broad, the selected readings will help us reflect on the major philosophical, religious, and literary movements and transformation in the western world. In addition, we will consider the idea of 'western world' as a construct and will think about its philosophical coordinates, as well as its transformations as it encounters other worlds and points of view.

While I expect to make no to little revision to our course schedule, we may omit or add texts depending on the time available for discussion. If such changes are made, you will be notified ahead of time, and if there are added materials, I will make sure that they are accessible through the TAMUC Library resources.

Student Learning Outcomes

By the end of this course, students will:

1. Students will demonstrate mastery of ideas, knowledge, and concepts in a clear and concise manner through written assignments as well as discussions that foster interpersonal communication.
2. Students will explore, locate, interpret, evaluate, and apply various analyses to text, thereby demonstrating skill in critical thinking, reasoning by problem-solving and applying knowledge.
3. Students will demonstrate academic engagement and collegiality as they participate in class discussions and activities.
4. Students will deepen their knowledge of the literary tradition in the western world.

Crucial Course Objective:

It is my intent that students from all diverse backgrounds and perspectives be well-served by this course, that students' learning needs be addressed both in and out of class, and that the diversity that students bring to this class be viewed as a resource, strength, and benefit. It is my intent to present materials and activities that are respectful of diversity: gender, sexual orientation, disability, age, religion, socioeconomic status, ethnicity, race, culture, perspective, and other background characteristics. I encourage your suggestions about how to improve the value of diversity, equity, and inclusion in this course. This course meets the following standards for diversity content and instruction in the following way(s):

1. Course content that includes readings and other materials that address various categories of social difference (gender, nationality, religion, ethnicity, race, age, sexuality, political affiliation, socio-economic status, ability, linguistic background, etc.) on the course topic.
2. Tying current events and local histories centered on the production of social difference into classroom activities.

Assignments and Exams

- **Weekly Discussions:** These are 1–2-page close analysis responding to the prompts that will be posted on D2L. The purpose of this assignment is to help you hone your analytical and interpretive skills by writing on the films and texts each week. It is important that in these reports you focus on the text(s) the prompt specifies. Consider these as low-pressure assignments, and as warmups and exercises that will help you write better essays and exams. You will need to write your own response to the weekly prompt and respond to one classmate. These discussions will be due before class and the due dates are available on D2L.
- **Presentation:** This will be a presentation on a topic related to the material we are working on in class. Detailed prompt forthcoming.
- **Essay 1:** You will write an 3-5-page essay (MLA Style) about one of the assigned texts. Prompt forthcoming.
- **Essay 2:** You will write an 3-5-page essay (MLA Style) about one of the assigned texts. Prompt forthcoming.
- **Midterm Exam**
- **Final Exam**

Interaction with Instructor Statement

I will be holding regular office hours (see the header on this syllabus) and I encourage you to schedule your meetings during that timeframe. Consider these meetings as a way for you not only to ask questions, but also to develop your ideas for your assignments, and to engage with the material outside of class. Things to Keep in Mind/Course Policies

1. All Writing Projects must be **turned in on D2L** (see next section for access) on the due date and time outlined in the tentative calendar. No make-up work is allowed on major assignments. Late work will be penalized 10% of the grade per day that it is late.
2. All work needs to adhere to **MLA format** with appropriate documentation.
3. **Plagiarism**, or turning in work that is not one's own, runs counter to the most basic purposes and presumptions of higher education. The minimum penalty for plagiarism will be failure of the assignment. In repeated cases, the penalty is failure of the course and filing paperwork with the department head (see section below on academic integrity).

5. All students will be graded on their ability to: 1. Achieve the goal of the specific assignment 2. Efficiently and effectively communicate through writing 3. Properly format the work and 4. Avoid stigmatized grammatical and syntactical errors. Each assignment will vary, but these four factors will always determine part, or all, of your grade.
