

Course Description

A study of the physiological, psychological, and psychosocial (biopsychosocial) factors involved in the construction of different concepts of human sexual behavior. Amongst the many topics covered in class, at least five different research and literature perspectives will be considered: (1) Evolutionary, (2) Developmental, (3) Clinical, (4) Social/Personality, and (5) Feminist.

Student Learning Outcomes

- 1.) Students will be able to demonstrate knowledge about the different psychological perspectives on human sexuality and sexual functioning through a combination of textbook readings, PowerPoint lectures, and in-class review sessions.
- 2.) Students will be able to analyze, compare, and contrast different aspects of topics related to sexual education (health care, anatomy, physiology, and behavior) through in-class discussions and weekly discussion boards.
- 3.) Students will be able to apply knowledge related to information through literacy, scholarly work, and research literature by incorporating instructors' feedback on their writing assignment and presentation and utilizing given academic resources.

Course Specific Procedures/Policies of Student Behavior

My expectations in this area should be very simple to fulfill. Please be aware of the following for this course:

- (1) Electronic devices should be turned off or put on silent when in class (unless you're taking notes with a computer/tablet).
- (2) Immaturity will not be tolerated. If a student's behavior is disrupting the class, he/she will be asked to leave.
- (3) Respect: Given the nature of this course, we may discuss issues that some of you may find embarrassing, uncomfortable, and/or even "inappropriate." To remain in this class, you must be respectful of others and maintain a mature and professional manner at all times. Failure to do so will result in your expulsion from the course.
- (4) Do not talk during class unless you are participating in class discussion.

- **Show up to class. A lot of information about due dates, goals of the assignments, and grading will be discussed in class- as well as information you will need for quizzes and tests.**
- **Email or text me: If something goes wrong, if you think something is wrong, or whatever the circumstance might be, please reach out to me. I'd rather get an email during the semester, than a freaking out student at the end.**
- **Start with the end in mind. If you plan on pursuing the A in this course, think about what kind of topic or presentation you want to develop, and make sure EVERYTHING you do in the class connects to that final project. Soak it all in. That way, you won't be making unnecessary work for yourself or for me.**
- **Don't overwork yourself. Make sure you set boundaries to meet your goals for this class. Have a plan!**
- **Utilize the resources that are provided for you via D2L. In utilizing all resources provided, there is no reason why you shouldn't be able to achieve an "A" in his course. Your instructor is also included in the umbrella of "resources" for this course. We give you resources to help you so use them!**
- **Lastly, don't plagiarize ANYTHING. I have not had an instance of plagiarism so far, but have a zero tolerance policy for anything that is plagiarized. Please refer to the links below for this universities rules on academic dishonesty.**

- **Turn something in whether you like it or not: If you skip an assignment, you will automatically get a zero. Don't make me give you a zero, I promise I want you to get a good grade as much as you want to receive a good grade. A low grade is better in the long run. Please submit something.**
- **Read the textbook! This information makes up 100% of the questions on your quizzes and a good portion of questions on your tests. I recommend setting aside a specific day/time to read your chapters.**
- **Complete all assignments thoroughly and on time. I am lenient about late work/assignments, but this depends on the circumstance and the student.**
- **Actively participate in class discussions. Contribute regularly. There are no wrong answers during class discussions, I just want to hear back from you. Participation is worth 5% of your grade.**
- **Don't be afraid to ask questions, ask for clarification, or ask for help. When in doubt, ask!**

Attendance

Attendance is required for this course. You will sign in on a printed sign-in sheet upon entering class. This helps me to record how often you are coming to class/who is attending lab and so forth. While I will take attendance daily, I will record attendance randomly throughout the semester. Attendance is worth 5% of your final grade. If you cannot attend class due to an unforeseen circumstance/emergency, please let me know and I will accommodate you by allowing you to attend class through Zoom (this will not affect your attendance grade). This is an option for students on a case-by-case basis.

Class Participation

Make sure you are actively participating in class each day. During class discussions, you can participate by answering questions and discussing topics with me (the instructor) and your classmates. Class participation is worth 5% of your grade, so be sure to engage as much as possible throughout the semester. Discussing the material and applying your knowledge to daily concepts has been shown to aid in a deeper understanding of the subject matter- which is what makes this component of the course so important. If I allow you to attend via Zoom, you must have your camera on and still participate in the class via chat box to earn a participation grade.

Chapter Quizzes

Quizzes will be assigned in D2L during the week the chapter is covered in lecture.

There is one quiz per book chapter, for a total of 15 quizzes throughout the semester. The quizzes will open on the Monday that we cover the material from the chapter, and close on the following Sunday, so you will have 1 week to complete each quiz. Each quiz will consist of ten (10) multiple-choice questions that are derived **DIRECTLY FROM YOUR TEXTBOOK**. So, be sure that you have read the corresponding book chapter before you take each quiz! You will have fifteen (15) minutes to complete each quiz. While these quizzes are technically “open book”, be aware that the time limit imposed will make it difficult to look up the answers to each question. Therefore, I suggest that you read thoroughly and refresh your memory before attempting quizzes. Collectively, these quizzes will account for 10% of your final grade.

Midterm Paper

Each student will choose a topic from a provided list (in D2L) on which to present, during the first two weeks of the semester. Visit D2L to sign up for your chosen topic during the first 3 weeks of class - **DEADLINE LISTED IN D2L!** The sign-ups can be found on

D2L under the heading/discussion post titled “Paper Topic Sign-Ups”. Only 1 person can cover each topic. First come first serve. Please pay attention to your classmates' selections. If someone chooses a topic you want before you do, you must

pick another. These topics will be directly related to the course content. As we progress through the semester I will walk you through the different sections of an APA paper to ensure your success in this area. By the time your midterm paper is due, you should have a solid research paper and know how to write a student-level paper in APA format. A helpful goal of this assignment is to prepare you for finals (your presentation to the class). You will be using the information you find for your paper to aid in your presentation. Keep in mind, this assignment is worth 25% of your final grade. You will submit this assignment on D2L under the “Paper Submission” heading that can be found under the “Paper” heading. The rubric for this assignment can be found on the course page in D2L. Please read the rubric carefully to ensure you are meeting the paper guidelines! This is exactly what I use to grade your paper with. I highly recommend using the following resources for your research:

- Google Scholar
- TAMUC Waters Library Online
- Research Gate

Important things to remember about your paper:

- Your paper **MUST** be in APA-7 format
- Times New Roman, 12pt font, etc.
- You **MUST** have both a cover page and reference page (s)
- All references must be retrieved from online peer reviewed journal articles **Final**

Presentation

Presentations will cover the topic you selected at the beginning of the semester for your paper. Presentations will be given at the end of the semester - see the schedule once it is released. Your specific presentation group/presentation day will be announced on D2L closer to the end of the semester. This presentation will be considered your “final” assignment. **YOU MUST PRESENT IN FRONT OF THE CLASS AND MAY NOT PRESENT VIRTUALLY.** Presentations will consist of short-timed summaries verbalized by each student in front of the class. You must present for a minimum of 10 minutes or you will receive a point deduction for time. You may not surpass 12 minutes or you will receive a point deduction for time. I will cut you off if you go past 12 minutes. **TIME YOURSELF. PRACTICE YOUR PRESENTATION AHEAD OF TIME.** After midterms, I will review tips with the class on how to construct a visually pleasing, professional, academic PowerPoint presentation. To complete this assignment, you will create a PowerPoint presentation

to present to the class as you discuss your summary. You will need to submit your presentation as a PowerPoint copy (**NO OTHER FILE TYPES WILL BE ACCEPTED**) **BY EMAIL** to my email address (Isabella.Ortiz@tamuc.edu) by the deadline listed on the schedule. I will upload these to D2L for your classmates to observe before presentations are given in class.

Failure to submit a copy of your visual presentation by the deadline will result in a 0 on the assignment. Presentations are worth 25% of your final grade, so not submitting this and not presenting will significantly impact your grade.

- Watch wordiness on your slides- summarize
- Include imagery/graphics on each slide that is appealing to the eye
- Create an original presentation
- Present the material in an interesting way
- Give real life/relatable examples
- Present for a minimum of 10 minutes and don't exceed 12 minutes
- Don't read directly from your PowerPoint- summarize the most important information and only use it as a guide
- Use note cards (but don't read directly from those either)
- Treat your presentation like a "professional conversation"

Tests There will be 5 tests throughout

the semester. Each test will open on a Monday at 12:00

AM and will close the following Sunday at 11:59 PM, giving you 1 week to take these on D2L. Each test will cover material from 3 chapters (e.g. 1-3, 4-6, etc.). Tests will consist of 60 multiple choice questions (20 questions per chapter topics). Test questions will come from a combination of lecture materials (materials covered in class) and your textbook. You will have 120 minutes to complete each test. No need to fear if you do not like your initial test score. You are allowed to take each test 2 times. Whichever score is higher is the one I will use for the gradebook. You will review the information that is on your tests several times through participating in chapter reviews, taking quizzes, participating in triple chapter reviews, completing your chapter readings, and participating in in-class discussions.

Lab Discussions & Assignments

As part of your grade for the lab portion of this course, you will have 6 assignments throughout the semester, and 14 lab discussions. For assignments, you will complete both in-class and at home activities including (but not limited to) answering questions about film clips that we watch in class/you are assigned to watch on your own and constructing written reflections on lab activities. For discussions, you are expected to answer questions thoroughly utilizing information

from your textbook and lecture materials. Your discussion answers must total 150 words at minimum. You must respond to at least one classmate. Your response must total 50 words at minimum. Remember to be kind in your responses to your classmates. Negative comments/bullying/etc., will not be tolerated.
