Course Overview

A survey of the social, political, economic, cultural, and intellectual history of the United from the Civil War/Reconstruction era to the present. United States History II examines industrialization, immigration, world wars, the Great Depression, Cold War and post-Cold War eras. Themes that may be addressed in United States History II include: American culture, religion, civil and human rights, technological change, economic change, immigration and migration, urbanization and suburbanization, the expansion of the federal government, and the study of U.S. foreign policy. Department strongly recommends the student be TSI compliant in reading.

Course Outcome

Upon successful completion of the U.S. history survey course, the student will be able to analyze and evaluate the ways in which the history of the United States informs the current political, cultural, environmental, and social issues of the United States and its relationship to global issues.

Student Learning Objectives

Upon completion of the course, students will:

- Students will be able to form substantive and evidence-driven arguments to propose solutions to problems or explain phenomena.
- Student communication will follow conventions of grammar and syntax appropriate to the audience, purpose and message.
- Students will demonstrate awareness of societal and/or civic issues.
- Students will be able to understand their role in their own education.

Required Text

No textbook required.

Instructor Expectations

You can expect me to treat you with professionalism; post assignment guidelines, deadlines, and rubrics at least two weeks prior to the deadline; allow deadline extensions to the extent my other professional obligations allow (sometimes I have to say no); update the grade book every two weeks, at a minimum.

I endeavor to respond to emails within 24-48 hours of receiving them, with the following caveats: (i) I check email occasionally throughout the day and do not necessarily view a message as soon as you send it; (ii) I do not read or reply to email during the evenings; (iii) emails sent from a non-TAMUC email will not receive a reply except to say that they need to resent the email through D2L or using their TAMUC email.

Student Expectations

As the student, I expect you to maintain a professional work ethic in this course; submit your work prior to the posted deadline; compose emails that are answerable in a sentence or two; come speak with me if your issue requires a more lengthy response; communicate with me in advance of deadlines if you want to request an extension; be attentive, engaged, and respectful in class; quietly step outside if you need to use your phone.

Success in this course depends on your willingness to apply yourself. If you find yourself falling behind, struggling with the content, or need to discuss other matters, I expect you to reach out prior to the drop/withdraw date. As a three-hour course, you should expect to spend an average of 9 hours of commitment per week. To pass this course significant time to study is necessary. Please allow yourself this.

Evaluation Standards

The final grades will be based upon exams, varying assignments, and quizzes that the instructor may choose to include. Instructors may include participation grades and attendance as factors in determining course grades, at their discretion. Grades are a tool to measure competency in this course. Effort does not equate to competency.

I will return grades within two weeks following the due date. After receiving your grade, give yourself 24 hours to think over the grade and any comments I have left. I will not discuss grades over email. Any questions or requests for a grade change must be for a reason (i.e., you may feel you deserve a better grade, but that is not a reason). Effort does not equate to points earned.
