Student Learning Outcomes

- Students will develop working definitions of oppression and privilege
- Students will be able to assess and identify patterns of governmental systems and various tactics to control populations during times of chaos
- Students will put their knowledge into practice by applying these concepts to the dystopian society in our class text
- Students will practice the skills of professionalism and civil discourse with the instructor, peers, and community through discussion boards and activities

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Minimal Technical Skills Needed

In this class, you will utilize the Learning Management System (LMS) entitled D2L for instructional and learning methods, submitting assignments, participating in online discussions, and completing quizzes as assigned. You will need to utilize other technologies such as Microsoft Word, PowerPoint, Search Engines, etc. If you have issues with this system, it is your responsibility to contact the help desk immediately.

Instructional Methods

This class will be run online in an asynchronous format. It will involve various forms of activities, discussions, and critical thinking. It will not be a typical lecture course. The skills and concepts you learn in this course shouldn't be merely memorized – they should be put into practice in your daily lives. Those practices require us to discuss your experiences during implementation. This course will be online and all assignments and interactions will be submitted via D2L unless otherwise noted.

All assignments, schedules, and due dates are subject to change.

Assignments/Assessments

Book Club: Reading Discussion Posts

Students will post to a discussion board responding to the weekly reading. Students will not be able to see their peers' answers until they post their own.

Original submissions are due by Friday at midnight of the particular week. Two thoughtful replies to peers are due by Sunday at midnight of the same week.

Points: 200 points per “Part” | 600 total points possible

(100 for original post and 50 points per response x Part One, Part Two, Part Three)

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Final Analysis

In your final analysis, students should provide a 3-5 page paper responding to the following prompts and providing a comprehensive analysis of their work for the semester:

1. Approximately a one page summary of the text (i.e. main characters, plot points, take aways). I understand one page is not much to summarize a novel. I want you to practice writing succinctly. What was most important to you? What was the story really about?
2. What did you learn about the concepts of oppression, privilege, and advocacy?
 - a. How were they present in the book?
 - b. How can you translate or compare this to any real life examples?
3. What does Panem et Circensus mean?
 - a. Why did it matter in the book?
 - b. How, if ever, have you seen it present in real life?
4. Lastly, any final thoughts about the book after reading it with this new lens. Like it? Hate it? Any new takeaways? Opinions? Questions? This is your free space to share.

No citation is required. The response should be 12pt font and double-spaced. Please add a header and title. A minimum of three pages of text should be written for full credit.

Points: 250

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Reflection Essay:

Students will complete a 2-3 page journal-style entry responding to the prompts:

5. What did I learn and/or take away from this class?
6. Did you gain any awareness?
7. What did you like and/or dislike?

This short essay is your chance to share about the experience from your perspective.

No citation is required. The response should be 12pt font and double-spaced. Please add a header and title. A minimum of two pages of text should be written for full credit.
