Course Description

The course is a discussion and analysis of social problems from a public health perspective. Some of the major issues that will be discussed include inequality, the opioid epidemic, the climate crisis, gun violence, and COVID-19. These issues impact individual human beings in their everyday lives. In each of these areas challenging issues regarding opposing views will be discussed. Students will be able to view themselves as engaged citizens within an interconnected and diverse world.

The syllabus/schedule are subject to change.

Student Learning Outcomes

Upon completion of this course, students should be able to:

1. Understand the social determinants of health.
2. Understand the impact of poverty and inequality, education, income, homelessness, rural living, race, and mass incarceration on physical and mental health.
3. Discuss climate change and its effects on public health
4. Describe and discuss environmental health issues such as pollution, foodborne and waterborne illness, workplace safety, and traffic safety within the context of environmental justice.
5. Define and discuss substance use disorder which includes drug use, dependence, and addiction.
6. Define and discuss the relevant history as well as current social, economic, and health costs associated with tobacco and alcohol.
7. Discuss and analyze violence in society with a focus on gun violence and suicide.
8. Define and discuss mental health and mental illness.
9. Define and discuss major chronic diseases and their relationship with mental health
10. Discuss and analyze the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic on public health and society.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Minimal Technical Skills Needed

Ability to utilize D2L, word processing, presentation, and database software; ability to utilize university email

Instructional Methods

We will review various nutritional topics and the role of nutrition in health and human performance. Instructional activities will include discussions, knowledge application activities, quizzes, and exams.

Student Responsibilities or Tips for Success in the Course

This is a college, junior-level course which will require students to be disciplined, motivated, and professional. Attendance, attentiveness, and quality of work should reflect that students are in professional preparation. You should plan to dedicate about nine hours of effort each week to succeed in this course. This time will be committed to reading the course text, attending lectures, and completing assignments. You are expected to read the course material so that you are prepared to have detailed discussions in forums on D2L

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Attendance:

You are expected to participate in class activities. Attendance will not be awarded credit. However, it is necessary to complete graded assignments. Given the online format of this course, attendance is evaluated according to completed work and participation in discussion forums. Strong reading and writing skills:

- Most of the material in the online environment will come from your textbooks, discussions, lectures, and videos; therefore, strong reading, writing and critical thinking skills are very important for success in an online course.
- Success in this class will come from independent reading of textbook chapters as well as other assigned material.

Self-motivated and independent learner:

- While online courses can offer more flexibility in scheduling, they require more self-discipline and independence than on-campus courses.
- In the online environment, you have to be able to start and to work on tasks on your own, without someone keeping you focused, and you have to be self-disciplined in order to follow the class schedule and meet deadlines.

Time commitment:

- Online classes take as much time as regular on-campus classes. You need to set aside sufficient time for study. Plan to spend at least as much time working on the assignments and studying as you would with a traditional course.
- Even though you may not have to "be" in class on some specific day and time, you still have to follow the **course schedule** provided. Remember that online classes are not independent study courses; you are still required to "show up" and participate actively (e.g. regularly logging into the course website, actively participating and turning in assignments on time).

Active Learner:

- Online students must be active learners, self-starters who are not shy or afraid to ask questions when they do not understand. Remember that you are in control of your learning process.

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- Since I cannot see you, you need to "speak up" right away if you have problems and be as explicit as possible; otherwise, there is no way I will know that something is wrong.

ASSESSMENTS

Quizzes:

Quizzes will be conducted to assess knowledge of the chapters in the text.

Exams:

Four exams will be conducted during this course to assess knowledge of topics covered during the semester. The final exam will not be comprehensive. Specific details will be provided during the semester in D2L.

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Discussions (5 Discussions at 40 points = 200 points)

Five discussions will take place during the term. You should post a **minimum of 5 posts per discussion thread**: one initial post answering the question (by 11:59pm Wednesday of the week it is assigned) and four response posts to your fellow classmates that further the discussion. All answers should be “backed up” with documentation. **Be sure to cite your references in APA format.** Each initial post should be a minimum of 150 words, and each response post should be a minimum of 75 words. Responses should follow the 3CQ Model (Compliment-Connect-Comment-Question).

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Current Issue Project

The final project is the culminating product (learning and application) to be completed by the end of the semester.

Each student will choose one topic discussed this semester (**due by October 13th via SignUp Genius which will be sent out via email**). Students will answer provided questions and provide a discussion of their topic. Students will submit this as a video presentation, including script. This submission should clearly demonstrate the knowledge you gained on this issue. **Submit your script and video link as a word document to the Current Issue discussion board.** Please remember to keep the link public so we can access your work. **Specifically, students will be evaluated on the quality of the presentation and their participation in the discussion board, which will include:**

- 1.** Choose 5 videos that others in class submitted. Each one should be on a different topic. (You should not use your own video OR a video with your topic.)
- 2.** Type a 200 – 400 word response to each of the five (5) videos. This should follow the 3CQ Model (Compliment-Connect-Comment-Question).
