1. Define health, community, community health, health promotion, disease prevention and public health.
2. Identify and explain the factors that influence the health of individuals and communities.
3. Understand and discuss the roles and functions of federal, state, local governmental agencies, and voluntary health organizations.
4. Identify the major health problems and influences upon health in the nation and worldwide, as well as efforts to deal with these problems.

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5. Explain the major health problems of special groups and describe programs designed to help them.
6. Describe and discuss ecological challenges and environmental problems affecting the nation and the world.
7. Explain how a community can examine its health services, problems, and resources and as a consequence, develop community health programs.

Assessments

Syllabus Quiz (8%): Important information is contained in this syllabus. You are expected to know deadlines, policies and expectations. Not reading this syllabus, D2L or your emails from instructors does not excuse you from being responsible for deadlines.

Introduction Discussion (8%): Students will post a self-introduction with photo to D2L. For full credit, each student will need to provide a reply to two (2) classmates.

Quizzes (17%): There are thirteen (13) quizzes throughout the duration of the semester. Each quiz will reflect recent material discussed in class. Quizzes will be online via D2L.

Reflections (17%): There will be five (5) graded reflections throughout the semester. These reflections will be related to either course readings or videos/podcasts presented in class. These reflections can draw on your own experiences but must demonstrate an understanding of the material.

Exams (20% + 13% for the final): Examinations must be taken on the scheduled day unless prior arrangements have been made by the instructor. There will be four (4) exams administered throughout the duration of this course. **Exam 4 is comprehensive and is worth 13% of the final grade.** Exams will be administered online via D2L. Exams may be made up of multiple choice, true/false, and essay questions. Should an emergency arise, you must contact the instructor within 24 hours of missing the exam in order to schedule a make-up exam.

Poverty Sim/Mass Causality Simulation (17%): Each student will select which out-of-class activity to participate in. Grading for this assignment includes being present for the event and active participation. See D2L for more details.

Attendance and Participation: Attendance will be taken in this class in the form of in-class individual or group work each class period. Failure to attend will be used in determining your grade for this course. Students are expected to attend each class period. Students are responsible for all class content/activities/work missed during their absences or tardiness, whether excused or unexcused.

- Student allowed 1 extension request for a reflection OR quiz. No other make-ups allowed.
- Student allowed 3 "freebie" unexcused absences. No questions asked.
- Every unexcused absence afterward will result in a 10-point deduction in final grade
- Students are expected to arrive to class on time.

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- Disrespecting the instructor or other students in any way may cause for dismissal from class and will be counted as an absence.

Any student with only 2 absences will receive 1% added to their final grade.
