COURSE DESCRIPTION

The purpose of this course is to develop the techniques for fundamental skills used in a variety of lifetime sports and activities.

Student Learning Outcomes

The Learner Will Be Able to...

1. Develop knowledge and skills required for several activities including, but not limited to, Pickleball, Racquetball, Badminton, Speedminton, Tchoukball, Kubb, Cricket, Rounders, & various backyard games.

- 2. Demonstrate the skills needed to be proficient when participating in the above mentioned activities.
- 3. Identify drills and lead-up games for the teaching of skills needed to be proficient in various sports.
- 4. Use the basic terminology associated with the assigned activities.
- 5. Develop a knowledge and understanding of the proper safety precautions that may be used when participation in physical activity is desired or required
- 6. View themselves as engaged citizens within an interconnected and diverse world through experiences with games and sports from a variety of cultures.

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COURSE REQUIREMENTS

You will be expected to use D2L and to have a working knowledge of the Microsoft Office Suite or similar. You may also be required to record videos, use video software and submit videos in the format discussed during class. You will also be expected to participate in weekly physical activities, if injury occurs or if accommodations are needed communication should be made with the instructor prior to class.

Instructional Methods

Independent learning, guided discovery, peer teaching, direct instruction.

Expectations, student responsibilities and tips for success in the course

How to succeed in this class:

- 1. Be in class every day, with your **cell phone off** and your brain engaged! It is YOUR responsibility to sign-in for attendance at the **beginning of class**.
- 2. Study the assigned material before every class! It is expected that you purchase and read the text (**bring to class**).
- 3. Turn in all assignments ON TIME in D2L (late work will NOT be accepted). Assignment due dates will be at the start of the class time.
- 4. All assignments submitted in D2L should use the following format when saved: "yourlastname HHPK ###" At the top of the document, include your name, class #, and the name of the assignment.
- 5. 10% will be taken off for assignments turned in without class attendance.
- 6. Do quality work!
- 7. Proofread your work aloud. Points will be taken off for submitted work that includes: spelling, punctuation and sentence structure errors. No TEXT language.

- 8. Take responsibility for your own grade; I do not give you a grade—you earn a grade.
- 9. If you are late or absent, it is your responsibility to obtain any missed information. Connect with a classmate prior to asking the instructor about missed content.
- 10. On activity/lab days, students need to be dressed appropriately for activity (comfortable/athletic clothes, APPROPRIATE/MODEST clothing, and proper gym shoes, NO FLIP FLOPS, SANDALS or CROCS).
- 11. Be ready to move! Participation is required. Activity accommodations can be made.
- 12. Absences, late assignments, missed exams or other will be considered in the event of medical or immediate family emergencies. Events must be communicated within 3 days and documentation will be requested (date, time, location required). Communication is key.
- 13. Grades, updated class outline and more in-depth assignment descriptions will be posted in D2L. CHECK IT
- 14. Volunteer opportunities and extra credit may be offered throughout the semester. Take advantage, do not ask for extra credit the last week of classes.
- 15. PG 13 classroom language, prepare for your future in a professional setting.
- 16. Students who are unprepared for class may be asked to leave.

Course Requirements

Skill tests (25%)

Skill tests will be given during the term. These will be given at the end of the week. You will have the opportunity to practice each skill test before you attempt it. You must be present in class to take the skill test. I will not test you outside class or on another day, except in the case of an emergency or a pre-arranged Universityexcused absence.

Sport Quizzes (25%)

A pre-assessment will be taken over the upcoming week's sport/activity content. They are due by the beginning of Monday's class, and no late quizzes will be accepted. Be sure to save your answers during the quiz and submit before time

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expires. Quizzes will be in D2L and you may use your notes but they will have time limits so content preparation is needed.

Outside of Class Experience (OOCE) (20%)

You are asked to participate in an OOCE in a LEGITIMATE activity or sport that is completely <u>new to you</u>; this means you have NEVER done it before!!! If you do not pick something from the following list, you must get my approval for it: martial arts, waterskiing (or kneeboard/wakeboard), snow skiing (or snowboard), trap/skeet, bowling, handball, fencing, indoor cycling (fitness class), CrossFit, Pilates, squash, other fitness activity. If we end up doing one of the preceding activities in class, you may not use it for your OOCE. If one of these events is offered through campus intramurals, you may participate in the tournament, trip, or event for your experience. If not, you must participate in a practice session, game, or match. Additional details in D2L. Students will be asked to orally present their work in front of the class (include participation photos, brief demonstration, and visual presentation).

Participation & Sportsmanship (30%)

This course is designed as a hands-on learning experience. To get the most out of it, class attendance and participation is a must (5 points per class). Students are expected to attend class on a regular basis AND contribute to activities (including equipment set up and take down). Attendance will be tracked and monitored; it is the student's responsibility to check in daily. Failure to show up for class, leave class early, or arrive late will result in loss of points. See class expectations for note on appropriate attire and accommodation needs.

*No make-up exams, assignments or quizzes will be given, unless arrangements are made prior to the assessment or a verifiable medical excuse is provided within 3 days. 10% will be taken off assignments that are submitted without class attendance.

Sportsmanship/Duty Note

This class is intended to be a learning environment. There is no Championship trophy. However, it is important to have some friendly competition. Many of these activities are brand new to the majority of you. It is intentional. Therefore, the class needs to be a place where we encourage others in their development. In addition, due to the set up the class, each session, there will be a time where you will be called upon to set up the fields, pick up the fields, and/or officiate games.
