COURSE REQUIREMENTS Instructional / Methods / Activities Assessments

The aim of this course is to provide you with the opportunity to search and critically analyze the existing

knowledge base and to write a substantive literature review demonstrating comprehensive knowledge and understanding about a particular research topic related to the field and profession of higher education. Topics related to adult education, human resource development, workforce development, and organizational development can be acceptable as well as they are part of our department's curriculum.

There are four learning units, with two graded discussion forums, an annotated bibliography, and the term paper (your literature review chapter).

Grading

Your grade in this course is based on the following weighting scheme:

- The discussion component of Unit 1 (your own posting and feedback to your peers) constitutes 10% of your final grade.
- The discussion component of Unit 2 (your own posting and feedback to your peers) constitutes 20% of your final grade.
- The annotated bibliography in Unit 3 constitutes 10% of your final grade.
- The most part of the course is your term paper (the Literature Review), which constitutes 60% of your final grade.

On all evaluations of your scholarly work (including the computation of your final grade), I use a scoring scale from 1 to 100%. If your assigned score is 79% or less, this will correspond to a grade of "C" (which is not an acceptable grade to doctoral students). A score between 80% to 89% will earn you a grade of "B," and any score 90% or higher will earn you the highest grade of "A."

*On discussion posts, both the initial post and at least 2 responses to your peers must be completed. No partial credit will be given for half posts (e.g. including either an initial post or responses to your peers). Both an initial post and at least 2 responses to your peers must be included. Failure to include all 3 component (1 initial post and at least 2 responses to your peers), will result in a zero "0" grade.
