COURSE INFORMATION

Course Description

Agricultural and Youth Leadership. Application of leadership principles with emphasis on interpersonal and personal skills, organizational structure, and working with youth in FFA and 4-H Club activities.

Learning Outcomes

This course is designed to provide students with the knowledge, skills, and attitudes required to organize, plan, coordinate, deliver, and evaluate co-curricular and non-formal educational programs in youth development and leadership. The roles and responsibilities of advisors for youth organizations as well as practical and motivational aspects of experiential learning will be included. Upon completion of this courses, students should be able to:

- Define leadership and apply basic principles of leadership to a secondary agriculture program
- Describe leadership theories
- Explain the importance of autonomy and youth voice through leadership activities
- Plan, coordinate, deliver, and evaluate FFA & 4-H leadership activities

Campus Concealed Carry Statement

COURSE REQUIREMENTS and ASSESSMENT

<u>Leadership Philosophy (100 Points)</u> – You will write a two-page (Double spaced, 12 pt. Times New Roman, 1" Margins) paper explaining your personal philosophy on what makes a good leader and how that connects to youth leadership. **Due 09/12 @ 11:59 p.m.**

<u>LDE Presentation (100 Points)</u> – You will be assigned an FFA Leadership Development Event (LDE). You will develop a 10-minute informational presentation on the event to be presented in class. The purpose of this presentation will be to recruit middle/high school students to participate in the event and give them a brief overview of the competition. **Presentation due 10/08 in class; materials uploaded by 10/10 @ 11:59 p.m.**

<u>LDE Training Notebook (100 Points)</u> – You will be assigned an FFA Leadership Development Event (LDE). You will create a training notebook for that event. The notebook should include the following: a general overview of the contest and how it works, rules for the contest, resources to help train a team, strategies for training a quality team, and a schedule or timeline for practicing and competing. Due

<u>Invitational LDE Coordination (100 Points)</u> – You will be responsible for coordinating and organizing an event at the TAMUC Invitational LDE. This includes getting materials, finding judges, scheduling, judging, etc.

Midterm Exam – Analysis of Youth Leadership Programs in Ag & Extension Education (150 Points) – This midterm will consist of an analysis of youth leadership programs. This assignment requires that you interview a minimum of (2) agricultural education teachers, extension agents, or other non-formal education personal. The purpose of this project is to learn about the benefits, challenges, and opportunities regarding youth leadership from the perspective of those individuals and connect it to concepts learned in this course. The paper should be a minimum of four pages in length and follow formatting guidelines described in the syllabus. Further instructions will presented in class and on MyLeo.

<u>Final Exam (200 Points)</u> – The final exam will be taken in class and will test your knowledge on concepts taught in lecture from the time the midterm exam was administered through the end of the course.

<u>Professionalism/Participation (100 Points)</u> – As future educators you are expected to attend class every day and be on time. Roll will be checked at each class meeting. You are allowed one absence. After that you will lose 10% of your professionalism/participation points for each unexcused absence. Included in this grade is your participation in class discussions and activities. Professionalism will also be assessed by your ability to follow class policies and campus rules.
