Course Description

CATALOGUE DESCRIPTION: An exploration of the fundamental elements and organizing principles of two-dimensional design and its integration of color and color theory.

ADDITIONAL DESCRIPTION: Assignments may include demonstrations, lectures, and videos that reference composition, color, the history of art, and specific media. Compositional layout and color mixing will be implemented through drawing, painting, and collage.

Student Learning Outcomes (Should be measurable; observable; use action verbs)

- 1. Translate ideas or objects in the physical world onto a two-dimensional surface.
- 2. Create designs using proportion, scale, color, value, line, shape, texture, direction, rhythm, contrast, pattern, repetition, variation, balance, and emphasis, gaining an understanding of the Elements of Art and Principles of Design.
- 3. Develop a mastery of color mixing and an understanding of value.
- 4. Understand how design and color are utilized in a variety of disciplines, and throughout art history.
- 5. Advance visual, physical, and conceptual problem-solving abilities.
- 6. Work independently.
- 7. Discuss the content and technique involved in compositions in a thoughtful manner during class critiques, using art vocabulary.
- 8. Understand how to articulate how formal details of an artwork and the use of metaphor work to communicate emotional affect and/or cultural awareness.
- 9. Create a comprehensive body and quality of work.
- 10. Develop behavioral skills by acquiring a positive attitude toward self, other students, faculty, facilities, equipment, safety, organization, and housekeeping in the work area.
- 11. Carry out directions, meet deadlines, and meet attendance requirements.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Minimal Technical Skills Needed

Artist research assignment and oral 15-minute PowerPoint presentation using Microsoft Word. Ability to access and complete assignments on D2L and possibly Zoom.

Instructional Methods

Completion of Projects on a timely basis. Once most of the class is finished with each Project, the class will move on to the next one. If student is not finished with their Project, they will need to complete on their own time and turn in by the deadline. There will also be smaller handouts and exercises to complete throughout the semester.

Research assignment on a chosen artist, citing sources, 15-minute oral slide presentations, using at least 15 - 20 labeled images. (captions should include title, year, medium, size). For presentation, identify three elements of art and three principles of design that artist utilizes in their art. A Research Guide and Tutorial may also be made available to students through the library.

Student Responsibilities or Tips for Success in the Course

- Excellent attendance & promptness. More than three unexcused absences will adversely affect grade. More than six unexcused absences could result in the student being administratively dropped. A tardy or leaving class early (unless with permission) will count as half an absence. If a student comes late to class it is their responsibility to notify the instructor after class. This applies to this in-person class (or possible live online Zoom format in the event of a Covid surge or other extenuating circumstance).
- Following directions on given assignments
- Positive attitude, degree of involvement, contributions to class discussions and critiques
- Respect towards classmates and instructor at all times
- Dedicated scholarship in class work and homework.
- Submitting projects on D2L on time, turning in graded assignments to Instructor on time
- Understanding of visual and art historical concepts
- Professionalism. Come to class prepared with art and materials. Phones must be put away and turned off at the beginning of each class and while the instructor is talking, or during critiques and presentations. Students may listen to music only while working on projects once all announcements and demos have been given. No viewing of videos. This is an in-person class.
- Academic honesty at all times. There is zero tolerance for academic dishonesty in this class. Be sure that you understand what constitutes academic dishonesty (e.g., plagiarism, cheating on exams, theft of instructional material or exams, representing the work of someone else as one's own, etc.). Academic dishonesty is a severe transgression in college and may result in referral to the Dean of Students, dismissal from class, expulsion from the University, and a failing grade.

- C Satisfactory: A positive attitude, which is reflected in your critique participation, response to criticism and professional conduct is expected. Your work must manifest acceptable achievement both in quality and quantity. You should possess satisfactory ability to communicate your ideas.
- D Poor: Exhibiting a below standard or indifferent attitude which is reflected in your critique participation, response to criticism and professional conduct could also result in this grade. A grade of D indicates your work is less than acceptable in quality and/or quantity. This grade could indicate your inability to satisfactorily communicate ideas.
- F Failure: If you possess an unacceptable attitude which is reflected in your lack of participation, response to criticism and professional conduct, and/or your work shows a pattern of low productivity and/or unacceptable quality you could receive a failing grade. Note: Plagiarism will not be tolerated in this class.

Course Specific Procedures/Policies

Late assignments: Late assignments will not be accepted unless you make prior arrangements with the instructor before the due date. Your grade will be lowered for late work. If you know you are going to be absent when work is due you may turn work in early and not receive a penalty.

Class participation and promptness: <u>Participation is required</u>. It is important to come to class prepared so you can take part in the studio work and group discussions. You will be called upon even if you do not raise your hand. Be an active and positive learner. You are expected to arrive to class on time and stay the entire period (unless you have permission from Instructor to leave early), whether for an in-person or possible online Zoom format. Leaving early is the same as a tardy. A tardy is considered half an absence. More than three absences will lower your grade. No use of cell phones during class, and phones must be turned off and put away. If there are any extenuating personal circumstances please contact instructor before class.

Attendance: Excellent attendance (a tardy will count as a half an absence, as will leaving class early. More than three absences will lower grade, unless student can provide documentation for excused absence such as illness. More than 6 absences may cause the student to be administratively dropped. Excused absences (such as illness) will be considered with proper documentation and communication with Instructor.

Plagiarism: Do not take credit for someone else's work. According to Texas A & M University-Commerce," the university does not tolerate plagiarism and other forms of academic dishonesty. "Academic dishonesty" includes, but is not limited to, plagiarism (the appropriation or stealing of the ideas or words of another and passing them off as one's own), cheating on exams or other course assignments, collusion (the unauthorized collaboration with others in preparing course assignments), and abuse (destruction, defacing, or removal) of resource materials. Plagiarism will result in a failing grade for the course."

From TAMU-C Professor Melynda Seaton: Standard dictionaries define plagiarism as "the practice of taking someone else's work or ideas and passing them off as one's own."

In A Writer's Reference, by Diana Hacker, plagiarism is defined in the following way: "Three different acts are considered plagiarism:

- failing to cite quotations and borrowed ideas,
- failing to enclose borrowed language in quotation marks, and
- failing to put summaries and paraphrases in your own words" (231).

Perhaps you are wondering how it is possible to plagiarize in a class devoted to your own creations. If you read the definitions carefully, you will realize that borrowed ideas, language, photos, artwork, music, and so on must be properly acknowledged.

If you write a piece of fiction, for instance, and "borrow" the plot from something you've read, you are guilty of plagiarism. If you write a commercial ad and create a character who strongly resembles a character from a film you have seen, you are guilty of plagiarism. Surprising perhaps, but true.

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According to Columbia College's LibGuide, plagiarism can include:

- Copying and pasting from a source without enclosing the text in quotation marks and providing a citation.
- Summarizing or rewording someone else's ideas without providing a citation.
- Reusing an assignment you submitted for a previous course. This is called selfplagiarism.
- Submitting an assignment completed by someone else.
- Collaborating on an assignment with a classmate or friend on an assignment meant to be completed individually.
- Writing a paper that strings together quote after quote or paraphrases, even if cited correctly. Your work must include your own original expression of ideas. To add originality to your assignment, include your own critical analysis, interpretation, and examples.
- Incorrect paraphrasing. When a paraphrase too closely resembles the original it is considered patchwriting.

Plagiarism can be:

- accidental accidental plagiarism happens when you are not sure when to cite, paraphrase or quote. This tutorial is meant to help you understand when you need to cite!
- blatant this type of plagiarism happens when you purposefully use another person's words and try to pass them off as your own.
- self self plagiarism occurs when you reuse a paper you wrote in a previous semester for a different course. You must submit original, new work for each course!
