Course Description

VETT 342 Veterinary Clinical Pathology II

Veterinary Clinical Pathology II will review content as it relates to normal and abnormal physiology of animal species. This course deals with the examination of blood, urine, exudates, and cells for diagnostic and prognostic purposes in veterinary practice. Topics include, but not be limited to: proper collection and preparation of biological samples, blood, and cytological samples and necropsy procedure and sample collection.

Student Learning Outcomes

- 1. Students will demonstrate the ability to perform a variety of clinical pathology procedures to include those related to blood, urine, and tissue.
- 2. Students will effectively be able to identify common findings in a microscopic evaluation of blood, urine, and tissue.
- 3. Student will be able to properly collect, process and ship specimens to a referral laboratory for analysis.
- 4. Demonstrate the understanding of how to prepare, handle and submit appropriate samples for diagnostic analysis in order to ensure accuracy of results.
- 5. Students will learn their role as a veterinary technician, team member, and client educator in a laboratory, clinical, and diagnostic setting.
