COURSE AND UNIVERSITY PROCEDURES/POLICIES

Course Specific Procedures/Policies

1. Attendance is mandatory. Art is a practice-based discipline, and the learning process requires active and dedicated participation. Students are expected to be present in each class, for the entire class period. Attendance will be taken at the beginning of each class. If a student arrives after roll has been taken but within the first 15 minutes, they will be counted tardy. A tardy counts as ½ a day. Therefore,

two late arrivals equal one absence. After a student has 3 absences, whether excused or unexcused, the instructor may reduce the student's final grade by a letter for each subsequent absence. A student who misses class or is late is responsible for any material

- 2. Class participation is required. The student is required to bring necessary supplies to every class, have assignments turned in on time, and participate in class discussions and critiques.
- 3. Working outside of class is required. A minimum of 6 hours of work is required.
- 4. Work must be completed by the due date. Late work will be reduced by a letter grade each day it is late.
- 5. A sketchbook will be maintained. The student is required to draw daily in their Sketchbook.
- 6. Document your work! Graded assignments must be documented and uploaded to D2L/Brightspace.
