COURSE INFORMATION

Course Description

ART 2323 - Figure Drawing

Hours: 3

This course emphasizes the solution of design problems through drawing media. The human figure is the focus of the course, but exercises and assignments will include other subject matter and nonobjective image-making as well.

Prerequisites: ART 1316 or permission of the instructor.

Course Objectives & Overview

This course will offer a general overview of the various methods used in drawing the figure and visual interpretation through various graphic and observational techniques. In addition, students will continue developing their personal voice, vision and approach to drawing and mark-making. Figure Drawing I is an introduction to the fundamental process of drawing the figure, from gesture and anatomy to rendering of form, space and depth. It guides your development of perceptual and descriptive skills through an exploration of a variety of drawing approaches, materials, techniques and approaches to figurative subject matter.

Student Learning Outcomes

- 1. Further develop drawing skills and techniques such as gesture drawing, planar analysis, contour lines, rendering value, creating the illusion of space.
- 2. Apply learned skills and techniques to drawing the human form.
- 3. Understand how the human body is constructed.
- 4. Develop an understanding of how to give the human form "life" in drawings.
- 5. Learn how figure drawing has been used in art history, and in contemporary art.
- 6. Explore and integrate a range of drawing approaches, media and concepts.
- 7. Develop a digital portfolio of class work.
- 8. Use the materials, knowledge, tools, processes and skills of the discipline including a range of media and surfaces to fully develop artworks from concept to completion.
- 9. Demonstrate professionalism in preparation, work ethic, craftsmanship and final presentation.
- 10. Produce drawings that confirm eagerness to try new methods and materials, boldness in execution and continuous production.
- 11. Use, understand and apply the elements and principles of design within own artworks, art writing and during critiques.
- 12. Create completed artworks of/about the human figure that demonstrate an understanding of materials, process and conceptual themes as well as technical and conceptual skills of the discipline.
- 13. Develop ideas and artworks based on research, exploration and experimentation of figure drawing, the discipline and beyond the arts. Synthesize and apply information and ideas from a range of sources, inspiration and materials.

INSTRUCTOR CONTACT & RESPONSIBILITIES

Please contact me via email. I respond to messages and emails usually within 24 hours Monday through Friday. Please do not expect a response over the weekend, holidays or after 5pm. All grades will be fully updated and shared for Midterms and Finals.

PROCESS & STUDIO TIME:

- This course requires 6 hours of drawing in class each week along with two outside major drawing projects and smaller assignments (sketchbooks, research, etc) throughout the semester.
- You will be expected to make full use of the class time in active work. On average, a minimum of one hour of outside work per every one hour of class time will be necessary.
- Participation, engagement, and discussion with instructor, peers, and other sources is important and expected when reviewing work, technique, process progress, assigned material, etc.
- This course will focus primarily on the production and critique of a series of drawings of and about the figure. You will receive project instructions throughout the semester. These projects may vary significantly in time and materials required.
- Project time span will be given at the outset of each new project.
- Studio time in Figure Drawing is essential, with the drawings completed from the model during each class making up the majority of grades for the course.

SUPPLIES, MATERIALS AND EQUIPMENT

Students are responsible for bringing all of the necessary materials to be prepared for work in class on scheduled days. *Please note that attending class without the necessary supplies or prepared surfaces will be an unexcused absence.

REQUIRED SUPPLIES & MATERIALS

Please see attached list of required supplies for the course. Additional supplies required as needed to complete assignments.

There are no required textbooks for this course. All required readings/viewings will be shared via D2L/myLeo.

DRAWING ROOM 201:

Your Lion Card will allow you to access the Drawing Room 201 outside of class time. Except when there is another drawing class, the room is open for you to use 24/7 – except on Holidays. You are expected to clean up after yourself and keep the room and all materials in the room in good condition.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

In-Class Drawings: The 2 best drawings are submitted from each class session into myLeo/D2L and a final digital portfolio. Drawings are to be completed during studio time from direct observation of models and other assigned subject matter.

Sketchbooks: Include notes, drawings, research, exhibitions & studies from throughout the course.

Outside of Class Drawing #1: Observational Self-portrait: Fully rendered large scale self-portrait in charcoal, 20" x 28"+, *non-photographic

Outside of Class Drawing #2: Final Drawing Project: Fully rendered large scale drawing with multiple figures, with research, studies and preliminary work 20" x 28"+

Exhibitions/Research: Attend at least 2 exhibitions during the semester and document your experience. Included in Sketchbook & Research Assignments.

Digital Portfolio: A final digital presentation of your work from the course.

Come prepared to work in class on time each day. This includes bringing all required supplies, materials and surfaces prepared.

CRITERIA AND RUBRIC FOR DRAWINGS & MAJOR PROJECTS:

RESEARCH, NOTES, EXHIBITIONS & STUDIES

I will occasionally require research, studies, and/or gallery and museum visits during the semester. These will be completed in your sketchbooks and/or submitted on the LMS/myLeo.

You should attend at least 2 museum/gallery exhibitions a semester and document each one. You are especially encouraged to go to all TAMUC gallery openings.

You will be asked to complete research and preliminary work as needed for assignments.

GRADING

You will receive a final letter grade for this course. Letter grades are based on participation, attendance, assignments, assessments, portfolios and critiques. Other factors determining grade are effort, neatness in presentation of studio work, and improvement in course. Keeping a sketchbook and practicing drawing while outside this course will be extremely beneficial. You can redo any of the projects assigned to raise your grade. You must redo the projects within two weeks, and the two grades will be averaged.

All projects must be presented for critique regardless of level of finish and submitted digitally to the online assignment in myLeo/D2L.

Work missing for critiques will receive an automatic 50% grade deduction. Projects will not be graded as products in a vacuum: a work will not receive credit that has not been seen during the process of painting. The grade given for each project will reflect several qualities involved in the course of its production. Grades will be determined by the consistency of student's efforts, quality, and quantity of work, as well as critique participation and class attendance. The student's willingness to take artistic risks will be looked on favorably.

Final grades in this course will be based on the following scale:

A = Excellent Work (100-90%)

B = Very Good Work (89-80%)

C = Average Work (79-70%)

D = Poor Work (69-60%)

F = Failing Work (59% or below)

A—Excellent Work: All requirements for the course have been met and many have been exceeded, and the work has been developed beyond previous levels on both an aesthetic and a conceptual basis. Artwork shows excellent intellectual skills and ideas, technical skills and craft, and control of the medium. Critical and conceptual understanding is evidenced through visual and verbal class participation that evidences both scholarship and leadership.

B—Very Good Work: The art work, its presentation, and the student's class participation shows

competence in skill development, craft, and control of the medium. Completed work shows an understanding of conceptual concerns in the context of contemporary art.

C—Average Work: Satisfactory work quality. Requirements for the course have been fulfilled adequately. The student has been present on critique days and for midterms and finals.

D—Poor Work: Requirements for the course are not adequately fulfilled

F—Failure: Lack of attempt in class and participation. No attempt has been made to fulfill the requirements of the course.

LATE WORK / MAKE-UP POLICY

Critiques are so important that even if a work is unfinished, it must be shown during critique. If the work is not present for a scheduled critique, the maximum grade a student may receive is 50%. All major assignments and late work must be submitted no later than 1 week after the due date. Late work for non-major assignments (ie: studio work, plans, research, exhibition attendance, sketches, etc.) is not accepted.

Late work for major assignments may be submitted with a penalty of 10% deducted from the assignment's value per day the work is late, unless the student provides proof of an acceptable mitigating circumstance: serious illness, death of a family member, or other circumstance if approved by the instructor. You can redo any of the projects assigned to raise your grade. You must redo and resubmit the projects within two weeks, and the two grades will be averaged. Please see TAMUC & Art Department attendance policies for what constitutes an excused absence.

If you were absent for a drawing session, make-up class/studio drawings must be submitted within 1 week of the deadline and <u>before</u> the midterm or final critiques (respectively), unless there are significant extenuating circum. This applies for both excused & unexcused absences, and does not eliminate an unexcused absence from the attendance requirements, unless there are extenuating circumstances approved by the instructor.

OPTIONAL EXTRA CREDIT OPPORTUNITIES

During the semester, assignments and opportunities for extra credit will be shared with everyone in the class via myLeo/D2L. These are not required and will not effect a students grade if they choose not to complete them or participate. The instructor will provide all students with the same variety of opportunities. Extra credit is provided at the discretion of the instructor and is not eligible to be applied toward specific assignments or offered to students individually.

CRITIQUES

In addition to completing actual drawings, you will begin to develop a critical voice in regards to your own work and the work of others. We will critique drawings periodically, though not every assignment will require a critique.

Attendance and participation during critiques is essential. If a critique is missed or if your work is not present, the work will receive a 50% grade deduction. Learning to speak effectively about art will be a critical part of this course. Critiques will be carried out in a professional manner. Persons late for critique will receive a letter grade drop in their assignment. Even if a drawing is unfinished, it must be shown during critique.

CRITIQUE DECORUM

Critiques are an essential component of this studio course. We will overview critique procedures in class, as well as collaboratively develop guidelines for expectations and goals. Parties may be asked to leave critique if their participation does not meet the expectations or standards of decorum. Art is personal, and the need to discuss personal themes may arise, so as fellow artists we must be considerate and conscientious during critiques (also see note on Course Content). It is expected to keep a sketchbook/notebook during critiques to write and keep notes.

Department of Art Attendance Policy for 100 & 200 Level Classes

Regular and punctual attendance is expected and required. Art is a practice-based discipline and the learning process requires active and dedicated participation. Attendance is taken during each class session at the beginning of class and/or after break. Students are expected to be present in each class, for the entire class period. Students will receive a letter grade deduction upon their fourth absence (excused or unexcused, at discretion of instructor), and each additional absence. Being tardy for class equals 1/2 of an absence.

If a student arrives after roll has been taken but within the first 30 minutes, they will be counted tardy. Two late arrivals equal one absence. Most lectures, demonstrations, and assignments will occur at the beginning of class periods and will not be repeated for those who come in late or for students with an unexcused absence. If you are late to class, you will need to notify me by the end of the class period to replace an absence with a tardy. Examinations, quizzes, and in-class assignments missed may only be made up with an official doctor's excuse or note from the office of student affairs excusing the absence for a reason covered under the official TAMUC Policy. Due to the nature of critiques, they may not be made up. When a class is missed, it is your responsibility to find out what was missed and what is expected of you.

I recommend you share contact information with at least 3 classmates, so that you may reach out to them for anything missed during class. It is your responsibility to source the missed content and information. Please reach out as needed so that I can support your success in the class and program.

STUDIO EXPECTATIONS, SAFETY & POLICIES

Students will dispose of all hazardous liquids (thinners, brush cleaners, mediums, etc.) in the hazardous liquids jugs. Dispose of all oily rags and oil-based solids in the red fire bins. **No paint, acrylic or oil, or solvents should be disposed of in the sink drains.** Brushes should be cleaned in the sink, but only after sufficiently rinsing them in your containers. Wash hands (including under fingernails) after using toxic materials and chemicals even if you wearing gloves. Wear protective gloves and use plastic drop cloth to contain chemicals, paints, and stains when applying. Artist materials can be messy, wear clothes that you are okay with getting paint on them or **you may want to bring an apron**. There is no smoking, vaping, or eating allowed in the studios.

You are expected to assist in maintaining a studio environment that is safe and conducive to learning. In order to assure that everyone has an opportunity to gain from time spent in class, unless otherwise approved by the instructor, you are prohibited from using cell phones or laptops, taking photographs, video or audio recordings, checking your email or the internet, updating your social media, eating or drinking in class, making offensive remarks, reading, sleeping or engaging in any other form of distraction. Inappropriate behavior shall result in, minimally, a request to leave class, which will be counted as an unexcused absence.

*Cell phones and headphones may be used for music in class during drawing sessions, but should not be out otherwise. Please put headphones away at the start and end of each class, during critiques, instructions, demos, etc. Please keep volume to a level that allows you to be aware of your surroundings. If you need to make or accept a phone call, etc. please step out to do so in the hallway when the model is on break. Your phone should never be out when the model is posing, undraped or on the model stand (draped or undraped).

Figure Drawing Studio Expectations

Be prepared for each class by bringing a sketchbook and writing utensil; bring appropriate drawing supplies and projects to each studio session. Cell phones, laptops, computers, anything with a camera and personal stereos may not be used during class, especially when there is a model.

Working with live models:

- When the classroom door is shut, students may not enter the room until the model takes a break. Please wait outside quietly. Please do not prop the door open.
- No photographing, touching, or emailing/ messaging /tweeting or unnecessarily talking to the model is permitted. Photographing models is not permitted. This class is designed to develop your drawing skills from direct observation/ from life and not photographs, it is also a violation of the model's trust to take a photograph.
- Cell phones and digital cameras are not allowed in the studio classroom when a model is present. They may be kept safely in your bag, but must not be visible. You will be asked to leave the class and referred to the Dean of student services if these rules are violated.
- For the most part, the model will work completely unclothed. We will work with models of all different ages, genders, body types, etc. Please treat the model with the utmost respect and consideration. Make sure you don't make comments about the model's appearance, or say something that could be misinterpreted. As a general rule, I am the liaison between the class and the model.
- The models will take breaks throughout each session. Students cannot leave the building or come back to the classroom late from these breaks. We will be critiquing in progress work during model breaks.
- Students can make up missed classes or obtain extra practice by attending other sections of Figure Drawing, or possible open sessions on campus and in DFW. Please email the instructor before attending another faculty's class.
- Students should treat models with respect at all times. The models are living, breathing, human beings and are not mannequins. They will move and adjust positions through the sessions. As artists we must learn to find solutions and be open to concepts surrounding spontaneous gesture and movement.

• It is customary to professionally thank the model as a class at the end of each session. They are professionals and are honoring our class by being here. It is a privilege to get to work from live models in the studio classroom and to have them be here.

STUDIO STORAGE & LOCKERS:

It is suggested that students use a locker in the studios of the art building to store supplies. You will need to bring a combination lock and share the code with your instructor. The shelving provided in the canvas storage room may be used to store artworks currently being worked on, but students should be aware of the potential for damage, vandalism, and theft when storing work in public areas and that students will be storing mostly wet paintings there. Please do not leave materials out in the studios, and be aware of the potential for damage, theft, etc. Works may not be left on easels or hanging to dry, and should be stored on the shelves or in the large storage closet. Please take work home when completed as storage is limited.

Handbook & Safety

While the online manual covers specific issues related to the Department of Art, Texas A&M University-Commerce policies must also be followed. All users of Department of Art (DOA) classrooms and facilities are required to follow the health and safety guidelines outlined in this manual at all times. STUDIO CARE & CLEANING

All students are expected to maintain and help clean up the shared studio spaces each class day, including sweeping floors and wiping down sinks and cabinets in addition to their work areas. Not maintaining the studio may result in a class letter grade deduction for the current major assignment for each instance.

END-OF-SEMESTER STUDIO CLEAN-UP

Students are required to attend and participate in the end-of semester studio clean up on the scheduled class date during class hours. Failure to attend and participate in final clean-up will result in a one-letter-grade drop in your final grade. You are responsible for cleaning your work area, your storage area, any checked out materials, and your hazardous materials area (inside the chemical cabinet). You are to remove all stored work and materials from both storage and your lockers.

<u>Final day to remove work: Wednesday, December 10th</u>. Any artwork or materials left after this day will not be stored for you and will be disposed of the following day.

COURSE CONTENT & SCHEDULE

- Week 1: Course Introduction, Preliminary Studies

Course Supply and Materials List

For the second week of class, you will need: a sketchbook, pen (any), graphite pencil/s and tools (eraser, sharpener)

For the third week of class, you will need: drawing board(s), newsprint, clips, drawing paper, kneaded and other erasers, chamois, all charcoal, conte, tortillons, 1 sheet of BFK, tape and fixative. You will use your Drawing Paper Pad every class. Newsprint & vine charcoal will be the most used materials in the course, some will be provided to start. Please see the course calendar as well for timing.

Required Supplies and Materials

- **Sketchbook** (9" x 12" minimum, can be shared with other classes)
- 1-2 Drawing Boards 22" x 28" + (recommend MDF/masonite @ 1/4" from Lowes/Home depot)
 Needs to be a rigid and smooth surface to support 22" x 28" paper)
- Large Bulldog Clips or Large Binder Clips (x2+), binder clips = cheapest on amazon, etc.
- **Drawing Paper Pad** (18" x 24" White Strathmore Drawing Paper or comparable, 80lb+)
- Newsprint Pad (18" x 24" or 24" x 30") 100 sheets, ie Biggie Newsprint pad*
- 2 Sheets of Cotton Rag Drawing Paper (22" x 30" min. Stonehenge (recommended), Arches Cover, Rives BFK, or other 100% cotton heavy drawing paper) *1 for self-portraits & 1 for final
- Chamois (soft leather pieces, available at art stores and in car cleaning sections at big stores)
- Tortillons/Blending Stumps (various sizes, suggest starter set of 3)
- Sharpener (metal, large and small whole) & Erasers (1 kneaded, 1 gum, 1 detail/electric)
- **Graphite Pencils**: Ebony Pencil (1) and set of asst. hardnesses: HB, 2B, 4B, 6B, 8B, or similar. *Do not get Artist Loft pencils or charcoal, many budget ones just scratch paper and don't mark.
- Vine and Willow Charcoal (asst. hardness at least both soft & medium)
- Jumbo Charcoal/Chubby Charcoal (1 jumbo charcoal stick or large chubby charcoal)
- Compressed charcoal (at least 1 white, 3 black, white may be conte)
- Charcoal Pencil Set, including white (suggest sm. kit with varying hardnesses, many include compressed charcoal, sharpeners, eraser, etc. General's makes solid affordable kits)
- Conte (1 white, 1 red/sanguine/sepia *variety set with those colors)
- Felt-tip or brush pen (1) & Fine-liner/Tech pen (1+, of choice, waterproof, ie Micron/Techliner)
- Masking/Drafting Tape
- Workable Fixative (archival)

By Midpoint of semester

- Watercolor Paper (at least 1 sheet 18" x 24" or larger, medium-to-heavy weight, cold pressed)
- 1 inch or 2 inch soft flat synthetic brush for creating large washes (water media)
- Brush set (for watercolor): set of golden/white Taklon, ie green short sets by princeton
- One color media (min. starter/primary set) 2nd half of semester
 *a) watercolor *b) gouache or c) chalk pastel (half stick set, artist/high-quality student grade)
 d) colored pencils e) acrylic f) oil pastels g) alcohol markers

*Additional supplies may be required, depending on how you choose to complete certain assignments and the surfaces you choose to work on/with.

Recommended

- Portfolio (needs to safely hold all drawing surfaces and papers safely)
- **Electric Eraser** (electric strongly encouraged, find a budget one for -\$5)
- Ink Tray/Watercolor Palette with recesses
- Soft thick brush for dry brush techniques
- Graphite Stick (4B &/OR 6B)
- 1-3" Chop/Gesso/House Paint Brush/Taklon
- Tackle Box/Tool Box/Flat Bottom Bag/Shoe box container to carry & store supplies
- Assorted/Misc. Drawing Tools (bring what you have in your pencil bag) pens, highlighters, sharpies, markers, colored pencils, crayons, gel pens, ball point pens, etc.

Optional:

- Drafting Pencils (blue/red)
- Water-soluble Graphite/Watercolor Pencils
- Watercolor/Gouache Set
- Coloured Inks
- Mixed Media tools of choice
- Colored Pencils, Pastels, Markers, etc.
- Additional mark making tools and materials... if possibly hazardous, odorous, etc... please check with the instructor before use in class or studios.
