Course Description

This scholarly writing and research in Educational Leadership course will give students the knowledge, skills, and dispositions to transition to the Carnegie Project on the Education Doctorate (CPED). This introductory research methodology course will be taught entirely online. In this course, the students will develop knowledge of academic scholarly writing and demonstrate facility with APA 7th edition in all written work. Students' course performance is expected to reflect the highest standards of academic integrity.

In addition, the students will be introduced to basic qualitative, quantitative, and mixed-methods approaches to learn how to use multiple frameworks and tools. They will also be introduced to the principles, tools, and methodology of improvement science, action research, and program evaluation.

Student Learning Outcomes - By the end of the semester, students will be able to:

1. Apply appropriate styles in writing, i.e., APA formatting, paper organization, and supporting claims with evidence.
2. Describe the characteristics of the problem of problem.
3. Identify the problems of practice, including questions of equity, ethics, and social justice
4. Define the problem of practice.
5. Identify the root causes of the problem of practice using user knowledge, literature, and systems understanding.
6. Apply knowledge of qualitative, quantitative, and mixed-method research designs to read and critically evaluate educational empirical studies.
7. Conduct oneself with academic integrity in the profession.
8. Prepare written work(s) following academic writing conventions, as presented in the current version of the APA Manual.
9. Describe the basic methods of qualitative, quantitative, and mixed methods research designs.
10. Develop a working knowledge of the principles, tools, and methodology of improvement science, action research, and program evaluation.
11. Write the purpose of the literature review.
12. Identify and write the steps in developing a literature review.

13. Develop knowledge of research ethics from a historical perspective and university-level ethics processes such as the Institutional Review Board, CITI training, and general research/dissertation process procedures.
14. Conduct Empathy interviews to identify problems in the system, unpack the root cause of a problem, and gather information that inspires new solutions.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Some of the assignments require you to make a virtual presentation using various graphics designs. The Instructor will create an engaging, positive learning environment and provide guidance for engagement with the content and learning activities. The Instructor will provide learner-learner, learner-content, and learner-instructor opportunities for each student to actively engage in the learning. I desire that you experience a quality learning environment as you master the skills and knowledge needed to accomplish each of the student learning objectives.

Student Responsibilities or Tips for Success in the Course

This course is taught entirely online. It is instructor-led with a course schedule. The course content is presented in D2L Learning Management System learning modules. Each module contains instructions, and the course schedule includes the due dates. In each module, you will work on various combinations of assignments, activities, discussions, readings, research, etc., available on the first day of the module. As a graduate-level course, the Instructor expects quality work from each student supported by adequate preparation and active engagement.
