COURSE INFORMATION

Course Description

This course concentrates on legal, ethical, economic, and political issues affecting the nurse as an individual and a professional and health care delivery to clients, groups, and aggregates. Consideration is given to self-discovery, personal assertiveness, role conflict, negotiation, and collective bargaining. Students are encouraged to apply critical thinking strategies during classroom discussions and presentations.

Student Learning Outcomes

By the end of the course, the student will be able to:

- 1. Discuss the impact of historical and contemporary issues on current nursing practice (AACN Essentials II, III, IV, VIII, IX).
- 2. Describe state and national statutes, rules, and regulations that authorize and define professional nursing practice (AACN Essential V, VIII).
- 3. Debate moral/ethical/legal issues that impact nursing practice and the health care delivery system (AACN Essentials IV, V, VIII).
- 4. Discuss the implications of healthcare policy on issues of access, equity, affordability, and social justice in healthcare delivery (AACN Essentials V, IX).

- 5. Compare and contrast the roles and perspectives of the nursing profession with other care professionals on the healthcare team, such as the scope of practice, education, and licensure requirements of the discipline (AACN Essential VI).
- 6. Articulate the value of the pursuit of practice excellence and lifelong learning (AACN Essential III).

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Minimal Technical Skills Needed

Students must have an adequate working knowledge of the learning management system, Leomail, Microsoft Office Suite, Examplify, ProjectConcert, and ATI online products.

Instructional Methods

Teaching methods include lecture, seminar, discussion, small group work, independent study of texts and library resources, computer-assisted instruction, audio-visual aids, student presentations, and assignments. While the faculty will provide guidance and consultation, the student is responsible for identification of learning needs, self-direction, seeking consultation, and demonstration of course objectives.

Student Responsibilities/Tips for Success in the Course

- Logging into the course website and email regularly for faculty communication (especially the night before class/clinical)
- Updating semester calendar with communicated changes

- Regular study (recommend a minimum 2-3 hours study/course credit hour per week). For example: 3-credit course = 6 to 9 hours study time/week.
- Attendance at all class meetings, clinical, seminars and simulations
- Review and remediation of examinations.

ASSESSMENT DESCRIPTIONS

Personal Philosophy of Nursing Statement

The purpose of creating a personal philosophy of nursing statement is to identify intrinsic beliefs and goals within the nursing profession. Defining a philosophy provides a deeper connection to those beliefs. A personal philosophy helps shape the professional self and provides direction for attaining skills needed for a successful, meaningful career. This assignment is intended to be the start of a lifelong, professional review of attitudes, beliefs, and values regarding key components of nursing practice and patient care.

Students will write a personal philosophy using questions from the philosophy rubric to discuss their beliefs, attitudes, and values regarding the four domains of the nursing profession (nursing, environment, person, health) and the concepts of excellence and lifelong learning.

This initial philosophy statement will be submitted at the beginning of the semester and reassessed and possibly revised near the end of the semester. Students will

evaluate where they stand with their philosophy at the end of the semester. References are required to support the statement.

The rubric for the evaluation of this paper is located in the LMS.

• Population-Based Ethical Dilemma Presentation (Group):

In this assignment, a group of students presents ethical issues encountered by nurses in a specific patient population and applies an ethical decision-making model in a simulated patient case.

Student groups will develop a 20-minute presentation of common or potential ethical issues associated with the assigned patient population; pose an ethical dilemma for a simulated patient; describe the ethical decision-making model used by the group in the scenario and the rationales for the choice; and guide the class through each step of the model to reach a final decision.

The presentation will be submitted for grading via the LMS assignment link before class. The grading rubric for the paper is in the LMS.

• Disciplinary Action Case Presentation (Group):

The purpose of this activity is for students to acquire an understanding of the Texas Nursing Practice Act and the impact and ramifications of individual nurse violations of the Act. Students will work in groups to complete a paper on the disciplinary action taken by the Texas Board of Nursing on an assigned Registered Nurse.

The body of the paper should be no more than five (5) pages in length. The paper will be submitted via the LMS Assignments tab by the due date on the course calendar. The case will be presented during a class session. The rubric for the evaluation of this paper and presentation is located in the LMS.

• Nursing Jurisprudence Exam (NJE)

Successful completion of the NJE is required for licensure in Texas. The exam consists of 50 psychometrically validated questions designed to test an applicant's knowledge relating to board statutes, rules, position statements, guidelines, disciplinary sanction policies, frequently asked questions, and other resource documents accessible on the board's web page relating to the regulation, licensure, and practice of nursing under the following categories:

- (A) Nursing Licensure and Regulation in Texas
- (B) Nursing Ethics;
- (C) Nursing Practice:
- (D) Nursing Peer Review;
- (E) Disciplinary Action.

You must correctly answer at least 75% of the questions to pass the NJE.

The preferred method of meeting the requirements of this assignment is to take the actual NJE prior to graduation and submitting documentation from the BON of successful completion.

The alternative method of meeting the requirements of the assignment is to complete the <u>online jurisprudence prep course</u> on the Board's web site.

Attendance and Participation

This assignment requires and recognizes student engagement in the teaching/learning process.

Attendance is met by being present for the entirety of each class session.

Participation is met by:

- 1. Engaging in substantive discussion in each class session and in each discussion board assignment. (Substantive discussion indicates the speaker has prepared for the class session and is presenting a thoughtful, meaningful contribution to the group.)
- 2. Leading a class discussion or activity. (In consultation and collaboration with the course instructor, each student will partner with one or two peers to lead the discussion or activity for an assigned class session.)
- 3. Paying attention to the discussion or activity in progress. (Avoiding distractions and avoiding distracting others.)

Assignment Submissions:

All class and clinical assignments must be submitted on time. If an extension is needed, students must request the extension <u>before</u> the posted due date/time. An assignment extension request will be approved or denied at the discretion of the course coordinator.

Unexcused late assignments will be penalized 10% per day for each of the first two days overdue; on the third day, the grade will be assigned as 0%. Communication on these matters is the student's responsibility. Multiple instances of late clinical assignments will result in receipt of a Student Performance and Behaviors Evaluation Form and, possibly, failure of clinical/course.

All documents submitted online are to be in .docx, .rtf, or .pdf format. No other formats will be accepted (JPEG, GIF, etc.). Assignments need to be submitted in a maximum of one document per assignment. Failure to follow these guidelines will result in a grade of "0" on the assignment.

However, a student can be removed from his/her team if the other students in the group come to the instructor and report that a student is not doing his/her fair share of the work. If that happens, the instructor will notify the student in writing. The student will then be responsible for doing the assignment on his/her own. It is expected that the group will make the attempt to resolve the situation within the group before instructor intervention.
