Course Description

Offering comprehensive coverage with an applied, practical perspective, this course covers all the major topics in the field while emphasizing reintegration and community partnerships and focusing strongly on assessment, risk prediction, and classification. This course will educate the student with offender treatment planning, special needs populations, and the comparative criminal justice fields to present a complete assessment of the issues and challenges facing community corrections today.

Student Learning Objectives & Outcomes

- 1) Evaluate past, present, and future trends pertaining to the development and use of community-based supervision strategies.
- 2) To distinguish between institutional and community-based corrections and know the purpose of each
- 3) To identify and evaluate the various social forces related to correctional practice and their trends;
- 4) To understand how human behavior for both juveniles and adults is viewed by the justice system.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS & GRADING

Exams

- There are three (3) in-class tests based on readings, power points, and other relevant materials.
- Each test is worth 10% for a total of 30% of final grade.

Tests are a combination of multiple choice and short answer. <u>Bring the green Scantron form (882-E) and a Blue Book to test dates (items available at the bookstore)</u>. Make-up exams are allowed only for verifiable emergencies and you must contact me prior to the regularly scheduled test date to be eligible to take one. Make up exams are essay-format.

Discussion Boards

- There are four (4) Discussion Boards based on a topic in one of the chapters
- Each discussion board is worth 10% for a total of 40% of your final grade.

Term Power Point Presentation

The term presentation should be 40 slides in length plus cover slide and sources slide. You will use library & web-based research to write about a corrections topic of your choosing. See the course *D2L* page for a detailed handout.

The final exam (Test #4) is an in-class, non-comprehensive test based on readings, lectures, and other relevant materials presented in the final part of the term.

Instructional Methods

This is a web based online course. Exams are based on PowerPoint slides, chapter reading and discussion boards. All PowerPoint slides are made available in clearly labeled modules in D2L. Material on the exam is emphasized in the PowerPoint slides and in the chapters.

Student Responsibilities and Tips for Success in the Course

- 1. Read this syllabus, slides, and all other material on the D2L page with great care and pay attention to their details. Mark test dates and other important notes in your personal calendar. Revisit the syllabus periodically and ask questions if you have them.
- 2. Students should attend to each chapter(s) weekly or as often as possible.
- 3. Before each week, students should review slides and skim sections of the textbook chapter(s) scheduled for coverage that week per the weekly schedule.
- 4. To prepare for exams, students should use lecture slides to locate all items appearing. Use the textbook's index to locate test items and skim those sections. Also review the notes you take during class.
- 5. To do well on the Term Presentation requirement, students should select a topic as early in the term by the due date and email it to the instructor for approval and suitability. Students should not wait until the end of the term to begin creating this presentation. There are due dates and students must adhere to those due dates as meeting those requirements are also part of the grade. Your instructor is always willing to provide feedback on early drafts. Finally, stick closely to guidelines on the Term Presentation handout on D2L for best results, grade-wise.

Community Corrections PowerPoint Final Presentation

- a. First, you will need to choose a topic from the text that you are interested in. You will need to send the topic to me via email for approval. Second, you will need to do research on your topic using resources other than your class text. You will need to send me a Literature Review citing at least 3 other sources other than your text. This should be in APA format. Finally, you'll make a PowerPoint presentation on your topic at least 40 slides long of your approved topic. Assemble a presentation that is interesting, informative, and that generates a good understanding of your topic. Be creative using pictures, color and anything else that you believe will show me that you understand your topic completely. Your grammar and spelling is very important so please use grammar check and spell check. Also, write in APA format on the written portions of your PowerPoint. Produce a quality PowerPoint on your topic that reads like a mini-term paper with an Intro, Topic Sections, Discussion/Conclusion, and Literature Review. Use Bolded Headings for each of these sections of the presentation and for the subtopics you address in the presentation.
- b. The deadline to get your topic approved by me is 09.13.2024. Please send in your topic via email. Your <u>Literature Review</u> should be turned into me <u>via email by 09.29.2024</u>. You should try to be creative in your approach. For example, you may use current events or past news items, popular films, TV shows, the internet, e.g. U-tube or other film clips, other media or data sources, etc. to provide examples of the topic material you are covering.

<u>Presentations are due at any point in the term however, no later than 12.06.2024</u>. This is so that you may benefit from questions, comments, and discussion on your topic, and so you can continue working on the topic throughout the semester.

This project will count as 30% of your course grade. If you have any questions, please do not hesitate to ask. You may email either email address or text the cell number I have provided.
