Course Description

(ENGL 2331) Literature of the Western World. Three semester hours. A study of selected works of fiction, poetry, and drama in the literature of western civilization from classical times to the present. Authors covered may include Sophocles, Virgil, Dante, Voltaire, Goethe, Dostoevsky, Tolstoy, Mann, and Eliot. Prerequisite: **ENG 1302**.

English 2331 Learning Outcomes

- 1. Students will demonstrate mastery of ideas, knowledge, and concepts in a clear and concise manner through written assignments as well as discussions that foster interpersonal communication.
- 2. Students will explore, locate, interpret, evaluate, and apply various analyses to text, thereby demonstrating skill in critical thinking, reasoning by problem-solving and applying knowledge.

- 3. Students will demonstrate academic engagement and collegiality as they participate in class discussions and activities.
- 4. Students will deepen their knowledge of the literary tradition in the western world.

Instructional Methods

This is a daily face-to-face course with material delivered through lecture, student led discussion, videos, and different texts. Students are expected to complete assigned readings before class to ensure successful participation in discussions. By the end of the course, students will have read an array of important works of fiction, drama, and poetry. Students will demonstrate mastery of the material through writing assignments, research essays, discussions, and reflections.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

It is crucial that readings are completed before the start of class. All writing assignments are to be turned in using MLA format with properly documented sources unless otherwise instructed. All assignments are due on the assigned date unless with few exceptions.

Unit Projects: Students will respond to a theme in one or more texts using creative media and written response.

Discussions/Reflections/Quizzes: Students will periodically be asked to compose a reflection on an assigned text. Participation in discussion is expected.

Research Essay: Students will write an 800 word essay over one or more of the assigned texts using proper MLA formatting and documented research. Prompt will be posted in D2L.

Final Exam: A comprehensive exam of the material covered in class. Questions will be written-response and multiple choice.
