- 1. Examine the European Settlement and Exploration of the New World that led to the English colonization of America.
- 2. Analyze the causes and effects of the American Revolution.
- 3. Analyze the government of the United States under the Articles of Confederation and the current Constitution.
- 4. Analyze the impact of European Wars on the new nation leading to the War of 1812; and show the importance of nationalism, the phenomenon of Jacksonian democracy, and the movement West.
- 5. Analyze the social, economic, and political forces (with particular emphasis upon the institution of slavery) that ended in civil war.
- 6. Analyze the issues and events of Reconstruction and appraise their impact upon the next one hundred years of United States history.
- 7. Create an argument through the use of historical evidence.

- 8. Analyze and interpret primary and secondary sources.
- 9. Analyze the effects of historical, social, political, economic, cultural, and global forces on this period of United States history.

## **Course Specific Policies**

If the student has extenuating circumstances that prevent the student from completing projects, quizzes, seminars, or participating in class by the due date, it is the student's responsibility to contact the instructor to make alternative arrangements before the due date whenever possible. Acceptance of late work is at the discretion of the instructor and the instructor may require the student to provide evidence/documentation for verification. Prior notification does not automatically result in a waiver of the late penalties.

Examples of extenuating circumstances where grace should be given to students may include but are not limited to: personal/family member hospitalization, death in the immediate family, weather/environmental evacuation due to fire/hurricane, or active military assignment where internet connectivity is unavailable for a limited time period. General computer-related issues and internet connectivity issues are not considered

extenuating circumstances. Students must ensure the technology they are using is compatible with Texas A&M-Commerce's technology requirements and contact IT if they are experiencing any problems with their Canvas accounts.

## **APA Style**

Unless otherwise stated, students are expected to adhere to the APA editorial style in all written work and in discussion forums, citing and referencing work appropriately. There are three basic purposes of citing and referencing: 1) Appropriate credit is given for the sources of information, 2) add credence to original work when informing the reader of sources of information, and 3) avoid plagiarism and academic dishonesty.

## **Plagiarism**

Plagiarism is the theft of someone else's intellectual property. It is a very serious infraction in higher education. If it is determined that a student has plagiarized any writing, the consequences will be decided by the professor. This could include a grade of zero and/or a referral to receive disciplinary measures.

## Al Technology

All is the use of technology to produce a product. If it is determined that a student has utilized All in any writing and presented the work as an original piece by the student, the consequences will be decided by the professor. This could include a grade of zero and/or a referral for disciplinary action.

#### **EXAMS**

Exams MUST be taken on the day announced. School functions/activities are not an excuse to miss an exam. Students must contact the instructor prior to any event to take the exam. Absences will require a doctor's note to allow the exam to be taken after the announced test date.

Plagiarized work and the use of AI presented as the student's original work will result in a 0 on the assignment with a discipline referral.

#### **EXAM DAYS**

On exam/testing days (including makeup testing days) students will abide by all instructions of the professor. Students will have no devices (including tablets, phones, and smart watches) on their desk or on their person during the exam. All belongings are required to be at the front of the classroom with devices placed inside and turned off or on airplane mode. If computers are necessary for a portion of the exam, students shall have all other tabs closed. Any other tabs open or extensions added to the page will result in an automatic grade of zero. Students will only have their Chromebook on their desk during the computer portion of the exam (closed water containers are also allowed on desks). You must inform the professor if you have any internet connectivity issues. Failure to do so could result in a 0 if academic integrity is questioned. During the written portion of the exam, students will only have a personal pen or pencil on desk (closed water containers are also allowed on desks). The professor will provide the students the testing papers along with notebook paper to write their essay answers during the

exam. Any other items on the desk or surrounding the desk of the student will result in a grade of zero on the exam. Failure to follow these procedures will result in a grade of 0, disciplinary action, and/or possible expulsion from the course.

#### **Classroom Behavior**

This is a college level class. Every student is expected to adhere to a protected and safe classroom environment. Any negative or derogatory comments directed towards another student will result in immediate disciplinary consequences from Whitehouse High School administration. Consistent disregard for proper classroom etiquette and classroom behavior can result in a grade of 0 for the weekly assignment including exams, failure of the course, and/or expulsion from the course.

Texas A&M University-Commerce acknowledges that there are legitimate uses of Artificial Intelligence, ChatBots, or other software that has the capacity to generate text, or suggest replacements for text beyond individual words, as determined by the instructor of the course. Any use of such software must be documented. Any undocumented use of such software constitutes an instance of academic dishonesty (plagiarism).

Individual instructors may disallow entirely the use of such software for individual assignments or for the entire course. Students should be aware of such requirements and follow their instructors 'guidelines. If no instructions are provided the student should assume that the use of such software is disallowed.

In any case, students are fully responsible for the content of any assignment they submit, regardless of whether they used an AI, in any way. This specifically includes cases in which the AI plagiarized another text or misrepresented sources.
