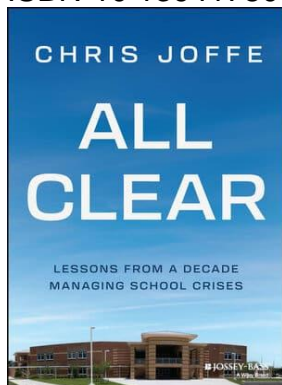

Instructional Methods

Throughout this semester of formal discourse, the scholar practitioner will embark upon a pathway of applying scholarly knowledge gained while navigating organizational practices in practical ways, solving district and campus issues. Non-negotiable is the expectation that scholar practitioners will employ the CPED principles when examining and addressing module assignments designed to apply critical thinking skills and effective communication skills (Weiler, J., & Virtue, E., 2024) when designing improvement interventions. Equity, ethics, integrity, and social justice are the CPED principles that will be incorporated into the course as reflective evaluation.

Instructionally, assignments were designed based on the professional practitioner's responsibility to lead design teams into evaluating current initiatives, utilizing improvement science and finding improvement practices that yield high impact results.

The instructor has designed the course to address Malcom Knowles four principles of the adult learning theory of andragogy as reported by Williams (2023):

- * Personalized Learning Experiences
- * Competency Based Education
- * Flexible Learning
- * Mentorship
