Course Description

This course will explore the topics of anger and therapeutic techniques to manage unwanted anger. Students will explore the definition of anger, its use, how it presents in a therapeutic space, and how to prepare themselves as therapists. We will briefly examine individual experiences and biases that may shape the way we approach anger and people that choose to address it. Additionally, the course will address practical ideas of how to apply the knowledge gained.

Student Learning Outcomes

- Students will develop a working definition of anger
- Students will gain insight into the positive and negative impacts of anger
- Students will be able to discuss ways to cope with anger
- Students will learn practical ways to incorporate anger management into counseling practices

COURSE ASSIGNMENTS AND GRADING

Discussions (5 points each)

Students will participate in 10 discussions in relation to the weekly assigned readings and videos. The discussions are to deepen your understanding of the material and its relevance to everyday life. **Discussions require a minimum of 100 words and are due on Sundays at 11:59 pm. Reply to two of your peers.** Replies should further the discussion with either your own thoughts/experience, research, or follow up questions. The initial post is worth 2.5 points and the two responses are worth another 2.5 points.

Outlines (10 points collectively)

Students will complete a 1 to 2-page outline for each chapter provided in the syllabus. All outlines should be uploaded in D2L for full credit.

Midterm Exam (15 points)

You will complete a midterm exam on D2L over the assigned material. More details will be provided as the date approaches.

Reflection Paper Assignment (5 points)

You will complete a reflection paper over the assigned material. More details will be provided as the date approaches.

Final Exam (20 points)

You will complete an exam on D2L over the assigned material. More details will be provided as the date approaches.
